The open book with a burning lamp in front of the eye symbolises knowledge and wisdom that emanates from the Divine. It also symbolises

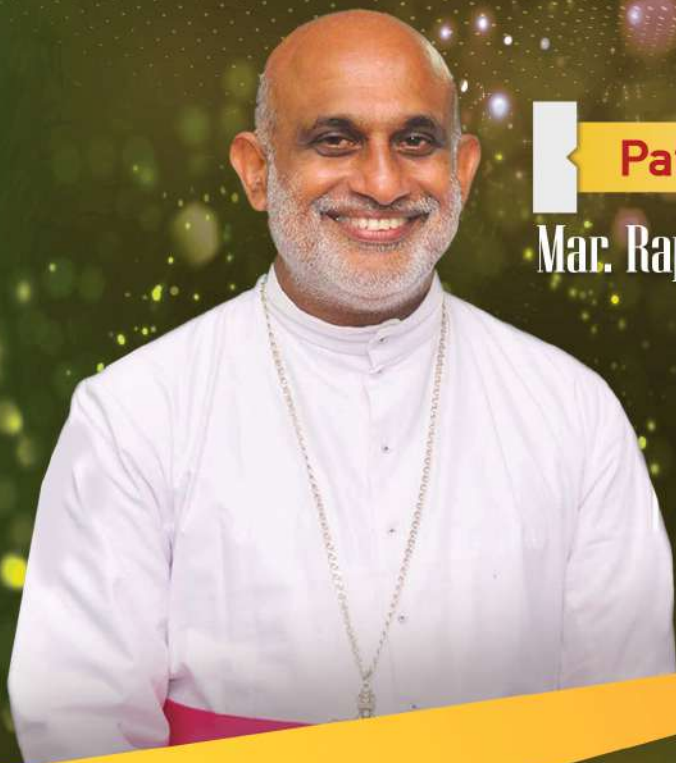

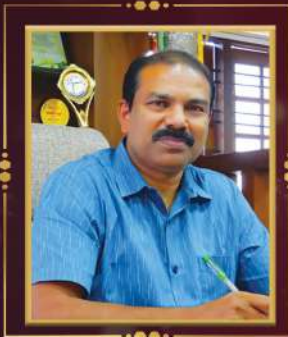

FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS OF INDIAN CITIZENS

Right to Equality (Articles 14-18)

Article 14: Equality before law

The State shall not deny to any person equality before the law or the equal protection of the laws within the territory of India.

Article 15: Prohibition of discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex or place of birth

Article 16: Equality of opportunity in matters of public employment

Article 17: Abolition of Untouchability

Article 18: Abolition of titles

Right to Freedom (Articles 19-22)

Article 19: Protection of certain rights regarding freedom of speech, etc.

All citizens shall have the right

(a) to freedom of speech and expression;

(b) to assemble peaceably and without arms;

(c) to form associations or unions;

(d) to move freely throughout the territory of India;

(e) to reside and settle in any part of the territory of India; and

(f) to practice any profession, or to carry on any occupation, trade or business.

Article 20: Protection in respect of conviction for offenses

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1. BHARATA MATA COLLEGE (AUTONOMOUS) - A PROFILE

Bharata Mata College (Autonomous), Thrikkakara, Kochi is a first-grade aided arts and science co-educational institution, managed by the Archdiocese of Ernakulam- Angamaly. Established in 1965 by His Eminence the late Joseph Cardinal Parecattil, the college was included under sections 2 (f) and 12 (B) of the UGC Act 1956 in 1996. The College was re-accredited at the A+ level by NAAC in 2024 and was granted Autonomous Status by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in 2023. The College was ranked in NIRF Rank Band 100-150 in college category of NIRF 2024.

The college is located at Thrikkakara, Kerala's mythological capital, facing the Seaport - Airport Road. Situated at a distance of 12 kms from the city of Kochi, it is easily accessible from Judgemukku on Edappally Muvattupuzha Road in the North, and from NGO Quarters and Palli stop on the Kakkanad-Ernakulam Road in the South, in addition to the BMC bus stop on the Seaport-Airport Road. The CUSAT, NPOL, Model Engineering College, Ernakulam District Collectorate, Infopark and CSEZ are the important neighbouring landmarks of the college.

Though situated in an increasingly urban location, Bharata Mata College largely caters to the higher education aspirations of socially, educationally and economically marginalized sections of a rural population belonging to different communities. More than 65% of the student community are girls. Started in 1965 as a junior college with five Pre-degree batches, the college today boasts of being a firstgrade college with 22 Undergraduate programmes, 10 Postgraduate programmes including 1 Integrated PG programme and 2 Professional PG programmes, 5 Research centres and an Off-campus centre.

The community comprises of 2890 students, 151 teachers and 71 members of the non-teaching staff. The dedication of the management and the community, combined with excellent infrastructural and teaching facilities help maintain high standards in curricular and co-curricular spheres of the institution. As an Autonomous College under Mahatma Gandhi University, Bharata Mata College has made conscientious efforts to strengthen the curriculum by retaining all the fundamental stipulations of the University/Higher Education Council, to ensure a well-balanced curriculum.

In keeping with the lofty vision of its founder, Bharata Mata College is a melting pot of students from all communities and creeds, thus preserving a secular character while promoting the Christian ideal of love and service.

14. BMC - UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES (BMC-UGP) (2024 ADMISSIONS ONWARDS)

As part of the implementation of the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP 2020), the University Grants Commission (UGC) has issued the Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes 2023 (CCFUP) which would provide a flexible choice-based credit system, multidisciplinary approach, multiple entry and exit options, and establish three Broad Pathways, (a) 3-year UG Degree, (b) 4-year UG Degree (Honours), and (c) 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research).

FEATURES AND OBJECTIVES OF BMC-UGP

The features and objectives of the BMC-UGP shall be:

- The features, meaning, and purpose of BMC-UGP shall be as stipulated by the UGC and as adapted by the Kerala State Higher Education Curriculum Framework (KSHECF) for undergraduate education.
- The practice of lateral entry of students to various semesters exists, but an exit with a Degree shall be awarded only upon successful completion of 133 credits as per the conditions stipulated in this regulation.
- BMC-UGP shall have three Broad Pathways, (a) 3-year UG Degree, (b) 4-year UG Degree (Honours), and (c) 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research).
- Students who choose to exit after 3 years shall be awarded a UG Degree in their respective Discipline/ Disciplines after the successful completion of the required minimum Courses with 133 credits.
- A 4-year UG Degree (Honours) in the Discipline/ Disciplines shall be awarded to those who complete the BMC-UGP with a specific number of Courses with 177 credits including 8 credits from a graduate project/ dissertation in their major discipline.
- Students who acquire a minimum of 75% in their graduation (up to 6th semester) are eligible for Honours with Research Programme. However, if necessary, the College may conduct screening tests for the Honours with research programme in accordance with College Regulations from time to time.
- 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research): Students who aspire to pursue research as a career may opt for a 4-year UG Degree Honours with Research stream under BMC-UGP with a specific number of Courses with 177 credits including 12 credits from a research project in their major discipline.
- The recognized research departments or departments with at least two faculty members having PhD shall offer the Honours with Research programme. A minimum 2 students (mentees) should be allotted to a faculty member (Mentor).
- Students who have chosen the honours with research stream shall do their entire fourth year under the mentorship of a mentor.
- The mentor shall prescribe suitable advanced level/capstone level courses



for a minimum of 20 credits to be taken within the institutions along with the courses on research methodology, research ethics, and research topic specific courses for a minimum of 12 credits which may be obtained either within the institution or from other recognized institutions, including online and blended modes.

- Students who have opted for the honours with research should complete a research project successfully under the guidance of the mentor and should submit a research report for evaluation. They need to defend successfully the research project to obtain 12 credits under a faculty member of the College. The research shall be in the Major/ allied discipline.
- The research outcomes of their project work may be published in peer reviewed journals or presented at conferences or seminars or patented.
- The proposed BMC-UGP curriculum comprises Three Broad Parts: a) Foundation Components, b) Discipline Specific Pathway components (Major/ Minor), and c) Discipline Specific Capstone Components.
- The Foundation component of the BMC-UGP shall consist of a Set of General Foundation Courses and a Set of Discipline Specific Foundation Courses. General Foundation Courses shall be grouped into 4 major baskets as Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), Value Addition Courses (VAC), and Multi-Disciplinary Courses (MDC).
- Ability Enhancement Courses shall be designed specifically to achieve competency in English, and other languages as per the student's choice with special emphasis on language and communication skills.
- English or other language courses shall be designed to enable the students to acquire and demonstrate the core linguistic skills, including critical reading, academic and expository writing skills as well as the cultural and intellectual heritage of the language chosen. Separate courses will be designed for the Science, Humanities and Commerce streams.
- Multi-Disciplinary Courses (MDC) shall be so designed to enable the students to broaden their intellectual experience by understanding the conceptual foundations of Science, Social Sciences, Humanities, and Liberal Arts. Students shall not be eligible to take the MDC in the same discipline that they have studied during their +2. Third semester MDC can be Kerala specific content.
- Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) shall be designed to enhance 21st-century workplace skills such as creativity, critical thinking, communication, and collaboration.
- Discipline Specific Courses shall include Discipline-Specific Pathway Courses, both Major and Minor streams, enabling students to gain basic knowledge in the chosen discipline.
- Discipline Specific Foundation Courses shall focus on foundational theories,



concepts, perspectives, principles, methods, and critical thinking essential for taking up advanced/ Capstone Courses. Practical courses shall be included in discipline specific foundation courses.

- The curriculum of the SEC should be designed in a manner that at the end of year- 1, year 2, year 3, and year 4 students are able to meet the level descriptors for levels 5, 6, 7, and 8 of the UGC Guidelines on National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF). The detailed descriptors of the NSQF levels are provided in Appendix I below.
- Value Addition Courses (VAC) shall be so designed to empower the students with personality development, perspective building, and self-awareness.
- Discipline Specific Pathway Components (Major/ Minor) shall provide the students with an opportunity to pursue in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline and develop competency in that chosen area, which includes Discipline Specific Core (DSC) courses and Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) courses as Major and Minor courses.
- Major components consist of three types: Discipline Specific Core or the Discipline Specific Elective Courses, and the research /laboratory/ fieldwork.
- Minor Courses can be selected from any discipline that may supplement or complement the Major Courses.
- Students who complete a sufficient number of Courses in a discipline or an interdisciplinary area of study other than their chosen Major shall qualify for a Minor in that discipline or a chosen interdisciplinary area of study.
- Major Components shall be the main focus of the study. By selecting a Major, the student shall be provided with an opportunity to pursue an in-depth study of a particular discipline.
- Each Board of Studies (BoS) shall identify specific Courses or baskets of Courses towards Minor Course credits. Students shall have the option to choose Courses from disciplinary/ interdisciplinary minors and skill-based courses related to a chosen programme.
- Students can opt for a change of Major at the end of the second semester to any Minor discipline studied among the foundation-level courses. Students also can opt for a change of Major at the end of the second semester to any MDC.
- Students should opt for their 5th and 6th-semester VAC and SEC from their Major disciplines only.
- Course cum Credits Certificate: After the successful completion of a semester as proof for re-entry to another institution this certificate is essential. This will help the learner for preserving the credits in the Academic Bank of Credits.
- The Advanced Level/ Capstone Level Courses shall be designed in such a



manner as to enable students to demonstrate their cumulative knowledge in their main field of study, which shall include advanced thematic specialization or internships or community engagement or services, vocational or professional training, or other kinds of work experience.

- Advanced/Capstone level Major Specialization shall include Courses focused on a specific area of study attached to a specific Major, which could be an Elective Course. They shall include research methodology as well.
- The student has the option to register for and attend a course without taking part in the CCA and ESA of that course. Such a course is called the Audit Course. If the student has 75% attendance in an Audit Course, he/she/they is/are eligible for a pass in that course, without any credit (zero-credit). The Audit Course will be recorded in the final grade card of the student.
- All students shall undergo a Summer Internship or Apprenticeship in a Firm, Industry or Organization; or Training in labs with faculty and researchers or other Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) or Research Institutions. The College will adhere to the guidelines on internships published by the University.
- Students will be provided opportunities for internships with local industries, business organizations, agriculture, health and allied sectors, Local Government institutions (such as panchayats, and municipalities), State Planning Boards, State Councils/ Boards, Research Institutions, Research Labs, Library, elected representatives to the parliament/ state assembly/ panchayath, media organizations, artists, crafts persons etc. These opportunities will enable the students to actively engage with the practical aspects of their learning and to improve their employability.
- The College will provide opportunities for field-based learning/minor projects enabling them to understand the different socio-economic and development-related issues in rural and urban settings. The College will provide the students with opportunities for Community engagement and services, exposing them to socio-economic issues to facilitate theoretical learning in real-life contexts.
- Additional Credits will be awarded to those who actively participate in Social Activities, which may include participation in the National Service Scheme (NSS), Sports and Games, Arts, participation in College Union-related activities (for respective elected/ nominated members), National Cadet Corps (NCC), adult education/ literacy initiatives, mentoring school students, and engaging in similar social service organizations that deemed appropriate to the College.
- Grace marks shall be awarded to a student for meritorious achievements in cocurricular activities (in Sports/ Arts/ NSS/ NCC etc.). Such a benefit is



applicable in the same academic year spreading over two semesters, in which the said meritorious achievements are earned. The Academic Council will decide from time to time the eligibility and other rules for awarding the grace marks.

- Options will be made available for students to earn credit by completing quality- assured remote learning modes, including Online programmes offered on the Study Webs of Active-Learning for Young Aspiring Minds (SWAYAM) or other Online Educational Platforms approved by the competent body/university from time to time.
- Students shall be entitled to gain credits from courses offered by other recognized institutions directly as well as through distance learning.
- For the effective operation of the BMC-UGP, a system of flexible academic transaction timings shall be implemented for the students and teachers.

ACADEMIC MONITORING AND STUDENT SUPPORT

The academic monitoring and student support shall be in the following manner, namely

- The College shall appoint a Senior Faculty member as Academic Coordinator/ Nodal officer for the smooth conduct of BMC-UGP.
- Advisory System: There shall be one Senior Faculty Adviser (SFA) for each department and one Faculty Adviser (FA) for 20 to 30 students of the class to provide advice in all relevant matters. The Head of the Department, in consultation with the SFA, shall assign an FA for each student.
- Students shall first approach their FA/ SFA for all kinds of advice, clarifications, and permissions on academic matters.

ATTENDANCE

- A student shall be permitted to register for the end-semester evaluation of a specific course to acquire the credits only if he has completed 75% of the prescribed classroom activities in physical, online, or blended modes, including any compensatory activities as specified by the course faculty of that particular course.
- A student is eligible for attendance as per the existing university and government orders which include participation in a meeting, or events organized by the college or the university or a regularly scheduled curricular or extracurricular activity prescribed by the college or the university. Due to unavoidable or other legitimate circumstances such as illness, injury, family emergency, care-related responsibilities, bad or severe weather conditions, academic or career-related interviews, students are eligible for authorized absence.



Apart from this, all other eligible leaves such as maternity leave, and menstrual leave shall also be treated as authorized absences.

- The condonation facility can be availed as per the university norms.

ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION

- The assessment shall be a combination of a Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) and an End Semester Assessment (ESA).
- 30% weightage shall be given for CCA. The remaining 70% weight shall be for the ESA.
- CCA will have three subcomponents: Knowledge Enhancement Assessment (KEA), Research Skill Assessment (RSA) and Internal Evaluation (IE). Each of these components will have marks and to be conducted by the course faculty/ course coordinator offering the course
- Regarding evaluation, one credit may be evaluated for 25 marks in a semester; thus, a 4-credit course will be evaluated for 100 marks; 3-credit courses for 75 marks and 2-credit courses for 50 marks.

PRACTICAL EXAMINATION

The scheme of evaluation of practical courses will be as given below:

19. COURSES OFFERED BY POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMMES (AIDED)

Duration: The duration of PG Programmes shall be 4 semesters.

Examinations: There shall be University examination at the end of each semester. Practical examinations shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester or at the end of even semesters as prescribed in the syllabus of the particular programme. Project evaluation and Viva-Voce shall be conducted at the end of the programme only. Practical examination, project evaluation and Viva-Voce shall be conducted by two external examiners and one internal examiner. There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration in each lecture-based course and practical course. A question paper may contain short answer type/ annotation, short essay type questions/ problems and long essay type questions. Different types of questions shall have different weightage.

Evaluation: The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) End Semester Evaluation(ESE) (External Evaluation) and (b) Continuous Evaluation(CE) (Internal Evaluation). 25% weightage shall be given to internal evaluation and the remaining 75% to external evaluation and the ratio and weightage between internal and external is 1:3. Both End Semester Evaluation (ESE) and Continuous Evaluation(CE) shall be carried out using direct grading system. Direct Grading: The direct grading for CE (Internal) and ESE (External Evaluation) shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 0 respectively. Grade Point Average (GPA): Internal and External components are separately graded and the combined grade point with weightage 1 for internal and 3 for external shall be applied to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA) of each course. Letter grade shall be assigned to each course based on the categorization provided in the following table.

A separate minimum of C grade is required for a pass for both internal evaluation and external evaluation for every course. A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the examination along with the next batch. For the successful completion of a semester, a student should pass all courses and score a minimum SGPA (semester grade point average) of 2.0. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of her/his SGPA.

Internal Evaluation:

The internal evaluation shall be based on predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars, lab skills, records, viva- voce etc.

Evaluation and Grading

Evaluation: The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) internal evaluation and (b) external evaluation. 25% weightage shall be given to internal evaluation and the remaining 75% to external evaluation and the ratio and weightage between internal and external is 1:3. Both internal and external evaluation shall be carried out using direct grading system.

a. Internal evaluation: The internal evaluation shall be based on predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests (2), Knowledge Enhancement Assessment (KEA) and Research Enhancement Assessment (RSA) with respect to theory courses. The weightage assigned to various components for internal evaluation is as follows. To ensure transparency of the evaluation process, the internal assessment grade awarded to the students in each course in a semester shall be published on the notice board



at least one week before the commencement of external examination. There shall not be any chance for improvement for internal grade.

External evaluation: The external Examination in theory courses is to be conducted by the College with question papers vetted by external experts. The evaluation of the answer scripts shall be done by examiners based on a well-defined scheme of valuation.

20. FEE AND SCHOLARSHIPS

A. TUITION FEE

Students can either pay tuition fees in instalments or in total at the beginning of each semester on dates notified by the College office. If the fee is not paid on the due date, a fine of Rs. 5 or Rs. 10 will be charged. If both the fee and fine are not paid even by the extended date, the defaulter's name will be removed from the regular rolls of the college and entered in the defaulters' register. These students will not get the benefit of attendance till they are readmitted, even if they attend classes regularly during this period. To get readmitted, parents of students have to apply for the special permission of the Principal besides having to remit all the arrears of fees with fine. A receipt signed by the accountant should be secured for all such payments. There will not be a readmission fee. But students should remember that they will be admitted to the second semester only if the first semester dues are cleared and to the third semester only if the second semester dues are cleared. Students from scheduled tribes, scheduled castes and backward communities admitted on the strength of income certificate from the revenue authorities, will not be allowed to leave the college during the first semester unless all the fee of that semester is paid. This amount will be refunded if and when the grant in respect of such students is sanctioned by the Government.

** The special fees notified in the schedule of fees should be paid in the first year during admission and in subsequent years along with the first instalment of tuition fee. Tuition fee can be remitted either in lump sum at the beginning of the year or in instalments before each term. The fee defaulters will be removed from the roll and they will not get attendance even if they attend the class. Fee defaulters are liable to pay Rs. 50/- towards re-admission fee in addition to fine.*

C. CAUTION DEPOSIT

Students are also requested to remit the caution deposit prescribed for their particular programme, along with the first terminal fees. Caution deposit is a security for using the invested property of the management and shall be refunded at the end of a particular programme of study, after the deduction of all dues, if any, to the college. To claim refund, students should apply for the same in a prescribed form and produce the original receipt. Caution deposit should be claimed before the reopening date of the ensuing academic year. Students belonging to SC/ST/OBC are exempted from payment of the caution deposit. But other backward communities should pay the caution deposit.

D. FEE CONCESSION

Students belonging to the scheduled castes/scheduled tribes, OBC and OEC are eligible for fee concession, granted by the Harijan Welfare Department. OBC students will have to produce an income certificate from the village officer. Children of all registered fishermen are eligible for educational concessions from the fisheries department subject to the conditions laid down for other eligible communities.



Students who are children of the Kerala Govt. servants who have died in harness or within six months after retirement will be eligible for full fee concession, provided their guardian's annual income is below Rs. 4,000. Students who are children and grandchildren of political sufferers are also entitled to educational concession, provided their annual income does not exceed Rs. 15,000/-

Students belonging to the forward communities too are eligible for the fee concession under The Kumara Pillai Commission Report. The concession is purely on means basis. The annual income should not exceed Rs. 1,00,000/-

21. RULES OF ATTENDANCE AND GENERAL BEHAVIOUR

True to the motto Pro Deo et Patria (For God & Country), BMC endeavours to train young students who enter its portals to grow into men and women of integrity and ability and loyal citizens of the city of God and our motherland. The rules and regulations of the college and the supervision of the staff and management are means to achieve these ideals rather than restriction on personal freedom.

1. Students and Staff of the college shall co-operate with the college authorities to ensure a peaceful atmosphere congenial to the academic activities and overall development of the students and for the maintenance of discipline on the campus.
2. The college timing is from 9.30 am to 3.30 pm and regular classes will be conducted from 9.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. Students should not arrive late to the classroom. At the stroke of the third bell, students should stand up in silence for the morning prayer.
3. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period by the teacher in-charge of the class.
4. A student is required to secure 75% attendance in order to be eligible for university examinations or to contest in elections. If absent for more than three days, the parent will be asked to meet the HOD.
5. Absence from class for an hour will be considered as absence for the entire session concerned. Absence for 2 or more hours will be treated as absence for one full day.
6. Absence must be regularised by a leave letter without which attendance shortage will not get condonation at the university level. (The format is available in the college store.) Students can apply for condonation upto 10 days. Condonation will be granted twice during a course.
7. Application for leave, countersigned by the parent/guardian/warden should be submitted to the Principal in person.
8. When leave of absence is required in case of illness for more than three consecutive days, application for the same must be supported by a medical certificate.
9. A student absenting himself/herself without leave for more than ten consecutive working day will have his/her name removed from the rolls. He will be readmitted only on payment of all fee dues with fine.
10. Students should leave the campus by 5.00 pm. in the evening
11. Students are expected to be clean and decorous in dress, language and behaviour. Students are not allowed to wear shorts, short tops, sleeveless tops inside the campus. Boys should not grow long hair or beard.



12. Students are permitted on the campus during holidays only with the presence of a teacher.
13. Students are to make use of the library during free hours and shall not loiter about on the verandas or corridors of the college.
14. Students shall use the property of the college with care and keep the building and furniture clean.
15. Any student who is persistently insolent, or insubordinate or who wilfully and repeatedly commits mischief or is guilty of fraud or malpractice or who in the opinion of the Principal is likely to have an unwholesome influence on his fellow students or tarnish the reputation of the institution shall be removed from the rolls. The removal shall be either temporary or permanent subject to the gravity of the misconduct.
16. Misbehaviour from any member of the College Community towards girl students, use or threat of violence against the members of the staff, physical violence or mental abuse on fellow students, drunkenness, use of drugs and smoking inside the campus will be considered very serious cases of misconduct warranting disciplinary action including dismissal.
17. Ragging is a very serious criminal offence under Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998 and is punishable with 2 years imprisonment along with a penalty of Rs. 10,000/-. Students committing the offence will be expelled from the institution and they shall not be given admission to any other educational institution for a period of 3 years from the date of expulsion. (Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998).
18. Students should wear their photo-pasted identity cards while on campus. Students who fail to do so will lose their attendance for the day and/or pay fine.
19. Students are not permitted to keep their belongings in the security cabin or other common areas.
20. Fee concession to SC/ST students will be granted only on the basis of their monthly attendance in class.
21. A student engaged in Union activities or other activities assigned by the college may be given an attendance concession for maximum 10 days only.
22. Under no circumstance, students undergoing disciplinary action will be allowed on the campus. They will not be permitted to attend or take part in the public functions of the college or to participate in the study tours of the department.



23. Students/teams authorized by the college and principal alone will be permitted to take part in the University Youth Festival/Intercollegiate Fests.
24. Prior written sanction is to be taken from the Principal for all seminars, fests, talks conducted by the departments/clubs etc. and of the guests to be invited, including that of the College Union activities.
25. 5000 watts is the maximum sound permitted for the sound systems.
26. Intercollegiate Fests are to be permitted on Fridays and Saturdays only. Cinematic Dance, Fashion Show and DJs are not permitted. Road Shows and Treasure Hunt are not permitted during working days.
27. Students are not permitted to enter or sit in other classes.
28. Performing cinematic dance and fashion shows within Educational Institutions is also prohibited by the Government vide G.O. No. 346/05 H.E. dated 1-3-05.
29. All expressions of activities which are immoral, anti-social, communal and anti-national are strictly prohibited on the college campus.
30. During college hours, the gates will be open to vehicles only during the lunch break.
31. Unauthorised entry of outsiders into the campus is strictly prohibited. Unless permitted in writing by the college authorities, students shall not bring or entertain outsiders within the campus during working hours and during the college functions.
32. No vehicle is allowed to ply through the campus during college hours. Entry and exit of two-wheelers are allowed only through the northern gate of the college until further notice. Vehicles are expected to be parked only in the space provided for the purpose.
33. Nobody shall collect money from others either by request or by coercion or buy and sell any article on the college campus except with specific permission of the Principal.
34. It is forbidden to organize or attend meetings other than the official ones which are specifically permitted by the Principal. No political activity shall be permitted in the campus. Strong disciplinary action will be taken against those who break these rules.



35. Use of mobile phones by students inside the campus is strictly prohibited during class hours ie; 9.30 am to 12.30 pm and 1.30 pm to 3.30 pm.

To maintain a focused and disciplined learning environment, the following rules regarding mobile phone usage are to be strictly observed:

First Violation: A fine of Rs.500 will be imposed.

Second Violation: A fine of Rs.1,000 will be imposed.

Subsequent Violations: The mobile phone will be withheld and kept in administrative custody until the completion of the course.

36. It is not permitted to distribute or circulate any notice, pamphlet, leaflet etc. within the campus or exhibit any type of banners, flags, posters, notices etc. within the campus without prior sanction of the Principal. Announcements and notices signed by the teacher-in-charge/HOD and countersigned by the Principal only will be entertained in the classrooms.

37. It is not permitted to stick bills, posters or scribble on any part of the building, compound wall, any wall, black boards or furniture. Damage to college property will warrant strong disciplinary action.

38. The campus is a smoke-free zone. Smoking or selling cigarettes and other tobacco products and drugs in an area within a radius of 100 yards of the Educational Institution is prohibited vide GO No. 822/05/H Edn. dt. 12.05.2005.

39. Students are to abide by the motto - Clean Campus Green Campus. Campus follows the Govt. instruction to undergo green protocol. So it is advised to avoid plastic items such as Flex, banners, cups etc.

Instructions for students appearing for examinations:

40. The students are expected to be present in the exam hall 15 minutes before the bell; those who reach after the bell will not be allowed to enter.

41. The students should collect their hall ticket on the day before the examination. In case of some technical errors in getting the hall ticket from the university, the students themselves should carry out the necessary formalities.

42. The students should bring their hall ticket and college id card to the exam hall; if missing/lost, a fine of Rs 100/ should be remitted at the office to get the provisional id card/ hall ticket.



43. The students are not expected to carry mobile phones, bags, writing boards, pouches, pictures or any such materials to the examination hall.
44. If caught for malpractices in the exam hall, corrective measures like banning from writing examinations will be taken.
45. In case the student wants to write the exam in a separate room due to some physical ailments, it should be informed to the Controller of Examinations in advance.



MAHATMA GANDHI UNIVERSITY STUDENTS CODE OF CONDUCT RULES - 2005

Mahatma Gandhi University Students' Code of Conduct Rules-2005 introduced vide UO. No. 162/2004/2/Elen, dated 16 February 2005 has laid down rules for maintaining discipline in all colleges affiliated to the university, which will be binding on all students of the college. The university order prohibits political activity inside the campus. Political activity is defined as "any act, activity or conduct by any student in a college by which political ideologies of any political parties recognized by the Election Commission are preached, professed, imparted or disseminated by speeches, visible representation or other means of communication whatsoever".

Prohibition on political activity inside the campus means the following:-

- (a) No student of a college shall get himself involved in any political activity by himself or abet the said activity to be carried on by fellow students inside the campus in any manner whatsoever and any such activity is hereby banned inside the campus.
- (b) Taking part in any political activity by organizing students or gathering inside the college campus for the purpose of doing any activity as defined in Rule 4 shall constitute serious indiscipline. Every member of such a gathering shall be individually liable and responsible for the gross indiscipline in this regard and the Principal has the power to take disciplinary action against students who indulge in the aforesaid activities.
- (c) It shall constitute gross indiscipline to call for an appeal to strike based on policies and ideologies that may be preached by the political parties or their sister organizations or student wings. The participants in the strike as aforesaid shall be dealt with by the disciplinary authority and they will be punished as per the rules stated above.
- (d) No student of a college shall stage or indulge in any activity like dharna, gherao obstructing entry and from any class room, office hall or other places inside the campus and such activities shall be treated as misconduct.
- (e) No student shall shout slogans inside the classrooms, office or any other place inside the campus and obstruct or cause disturbance to the everyday functioning of the institution.



22. STUDENTS' CODE OF CONDUCT

The students accept to obey the rules and respect the discipline of the college once they are enrolled in the college. Students are expected to obey the following rules:

1. Work in the college begins every morning, with a prayer recited on the public address system. Students are to remain standing wherever they are and participate silently in the prayer.
2. Students should attend classes with regularity and punctuality.
3. Students are required to dress modestly and to refrain from causing disturbance to anyone inside the classroom or on the campus.
4. Students are expected to be in their seats before the teacher enters the classroom and during free hours, they may make use of the Reading Rooms in the General Library.
5. Every student shall handle college property with care. He/she shall keep the classroom clean and tidy. Students found guilty of writing or making marks on the walls, desks, or any other part of the college buildings, or causing damage to college property shall be severely punished. Loss caused by damage to furniture or equipment belonging to the college will be made good by imposing collective fines from the respective students. Waste paper should be deposited in the bins provided for the purpose.
6. Students are not permitted
 - (a) to convene or attend meetings of any sort in any circumstance anywhere in the college buildings or campus
 - (b) to set up entertainments or organise social functions in the college,
 - (c) to make use of megaphones and loudspeakers on the campus,
 - (d) to invite persons who are not approved of by the Principal and the Council of the Heads of Departments for any function in the college.
 - (e) to collect subscriptions of any kind
 - (f) to put up notices anywhere on the campus
 - (g) to place any paper, periodical or book in the Reading Rooms or circulate them in the college
 - (h) to work on the campus for any organisation outside the college



(i) to be on the campus one hour before and after the college working hours without the previous sanction of the Principal

7. All sorts of political activities are banned in the college. Students are forbidden to take membership in any student organisation of a political nature. Nor are they permitted, within the campus, to lead or partake in any act of propaganda or protest called for by such organisations.
8. The use of mobile phones, by students during class hours is forbidden.
9. Smoking, drinking alcohol, using drugs, ragging, eve teasing, using abusive language and other anti-social activities are strictly prohibited. Students found engaging in these activities shall be severely punished.
10. Any notification published on the college website or notice signed/ countersigned by the Principal and published on the College Notice Board shall be considered as having been brought to the notice of the college community.
11. Photo identity cards will be issued to all students in the college. Every student is expected to wear it in the College. A student who is unable to produce his/her ID card on demand shall be reprimanded and fined.
12. Any student who, in the opinion of the Principal, is likely to have an unwholesome influence on others on the campus will have to face disciplinary action.
13. The authority of the Principal in matters of discipline is final.

14. Prohibited Conduct (Illustrative)

A. Category I (Minor Offenses):

- Using mobile phones in class/library.
- Not wearing ID card.
- Aimless loitering during class time.
- Not disclosing identity when asked.
- Improper parking or littering.
- Habitual absenteeism.
- Putting up notices anywhere on the campus without prior approval.
- Placing any paper, periodical, or book in the Reading Rooms or circulating them without sanction.
- Working on campus for any organization outside the college without approval.
- Being on the campus one hour before or after working hours without prior sanction of the principal.



B. Category II (Major Offenses):

- Repeated minor violations.
- Substance abuse (alcohol/drugs).
- Physical fights, threats, ragging, and sexual harassment.
- Forgery, impersonation, theft, or vandalism.
- Posting defamatory content on social media.
- Participating in or promoting unlawful protests or strikes.
- Any specific political party–related activities inside the campus.
- Convening or attending unauthorized meetings within the college buildings or campus.
- Setting up entertainment or organizing social functions without approval.
- Using megaphones or loudspeakers on the campus.
- Gambling, forgery, impersonation, or misbehaviour will result in strict action.
- Misconduct towards women students or staff will be treated as a serious offense.
- Inviting persons not approved by the Principal or Council of Heads of Departments for any function in the college.
- Collecting subscriptions of any kind without sanction.
- Leading, partaking in, or promoting propaganda or protests called for by political organizations.

15. Disciplinary Measures

Based on the gravity of the offense, any of the following may be imposed:

A. For Category I Violations:

- Warning/Admonition
- Temporary suspension from class/library
- Withdrawal of privileges (scholarships, hostel, library access)
- Fine as decided by the Discipline Committee

B. For Category II Violations:

- Suspension/Rustication (up to 2 semesters)
- Cancellation of admission
- Expulsion
- All penalties shall be decided by the principal based on recommendations from the Disciplinary Committee/Proctorial Board.
- Fine as decided by the Discipline Committee



16. Disciplinary Authority

The principal has the authority to impose disciplinary action, including suspension or permanent removal from the rolls, against students who violate the rules.

The principal's decision shall be final in all matters related to discipline.

17. Appeals

Students may appeal to the College Disciplinary Committee or the MGU grievance redressal forum, as applicable. Appeals against expulsion or major punishments must be filed within 10 working days of receiving the order.

18. Any questions or issues not covered by the foregoing rules shall be decided by the Principal.

All the students are obliged to follow the Mahatma Gandhi University Students Code of Conduct Rules 2005.



KERALA RAGGING PROHIBITION ACT 1998

23. LIBRARY RULES

1. Library is a place for serious study and research. So strict silence is to be maintained.
2. The library will be open from 8.30 am to 5.30 pm on Monday to Friday and from 8.30 am to 4.30 pm on Saturdays. (except public holidays and second Saturdays)
3. Identity card is compulsory for entering the library.
4. Books are issued against the library membership cards on all working days till 4 pm.
5. Reference books and periodicals will not be issued for home reading.
6. Students must examine the books taken by them and report to the librarian if the books are in a damaged condition before taking them away.
7. Any book lost or damaged, must be replaced with the same one or latest edition. (in case of multi-volume set, complete set should be replaced).
8. The library card must be returned on the completion of the course. In case of loss of membership card, a fine of Rs 50/ will be charged and a fresh card will be issued against an application in writing to the librarian.
9. Circulation Rules: The loan period is 14 working days for all categories of readers. Renewal is possible only on-e time and it is for 7 days only.
UG – 2 Books, PG - 4 Books, Research Scholar – 5 Books, Faculty – 10 Books, Guest faculty – 5 Books, Non teaching staff - 3 books.
10. All the readers should submit their library books during vacations and continuous leave in the college.
11. On failure to submit the books on or before the due date, you will be charged a fine of Rs: 1/ per day per book till you return.
12. No-due certificate should be collected from the library on retirement/ expiry of contract/course completion/course discontinuation etc.



24. CAMPUS FACILITIES & AMENITIES

- 1. Cardinal Parecattil Auditorium** – A multi-facility fully air-conditioned auditorium with a seating capacity of 1500. It consists of a well-equipped stage, attractive lights with a provision for world class acoustic system with a warm and welcoming ambience. Two green rooms, an array of washrooms, ample storage, work and parking space make it a converging point of academic space, cultural hub and utility. It serves as the venue for various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- 2. Audio-Visual Room** – To facilitate interactive learning, college has a well-designed, state-of-the-art multifunctional digital audio-visual room, equipped with technologically advanced electronic instrument, high end speakers, LCD Projector, a large screen for audio visual presentations. The facility can be used to record lectures and create e-content. The room is acoustically treated for better sound recordings. The room is arranged with theatre style seating with a seating capacity of around 80, giving students a live multimedia experience.
- 3. Mar Augustine Kandathil Students' Hall** – The student's hall: near to college library with a capacity of 350 seats, has a spacious stage and all the facilities of an auditorium. Used for uplifting the artistic competitiveness and various skills of the student community and for conducting departmental functions, club activities and meetings of various student support organisations.
- 4. Seminar Halls** – There are four seminar halls - Mar Louis Pazhaparambil hall, Mar. Antony Cardinal Padiyara Seminar hall, Mar. Sebastian Mankuzhikari seminar hall, Mar Abraham Kattumana conference hall in the different blocks with audio-visual facilities for seminars and conferences of an exclusive nature.
- 5. Examination Halls** – Mar. Jacob Manathodath examination hall and Mar. Varkey Cardinal Vithayathil examination hall are used for UG & PG examinations.
- 6. Golden Jubilee Block** – The College has a separate block for self-financing Programmes, equipped with class rooms, faculty rooms, library, computer lab, washrooms as well as office for academic support. The 22 rooms of the Golden Jubilee Block are Wi-Fi enabled. Each of the classrooms is equipped with Hickvision/Senses interactive boards to facilitate the teaching-learning process, generally with a seating capacity of 65 students. The block has a well-equipped computer lab with 65 systems.



- 7. Library** – The college library with a collection of over 60000 books, ebooks, 39 journals, 32 periodicals and 3 subscribed databases are the key source of academic assistance to the community. The library is fully computerized and digitalized with Machine Readable Catalogue facility for searching and Bar-coding for detection and transparency. For the overall management of library operations, the library is automated with the programme KOHA. The Dewey Decimal Classification Scheme, 22nd edition, is used to classify books.
- 8. IQAC** – The IQAC of the institution is situated on the ground floor to enable easy access to students and staff alike. Digitizing the academic and non-academic records, scheduling the various events and activities, etc, falls under the prioritized responsibilities of the IQAC. The exceptionally furnished air-conditioned rooms are equipped with computers and Wi-Fi facilities. The conference room within serves as a meeting hall for various official discussions. The spacious rooms are further segregated into cubicles to ensure the smooth functioning of the separate faculty and ensure productive output.
- 9. Reception** – The front office staff provide a welcoming environment and appropriate hospitality for visitors. They support the ethos of the college and promote professional image of the institution. Queries of visitors are addressed promptly at the front office and they are directed to the places where they want to. The reception is equipped with different devices like photostat machine, printer and computer.
- 10. Computer Centre** – The Centre offers short term courses in MS Office, Visual Basics & DTP. Internet browsing is available to the college community free of cost as the campus is wire-free.
- 11. Language Lab** – There are two language labs – one in the Main Block and the other in the MBA Block, which facilitate students to fine-tune their communication skills.
- 12. Media Lab** – A full-fledged media lab of the Malayalam Copywriting Course with NXG Camera, editing software, digital recorders and related facilities is the first of its kind in the state associated with an arts department. In addition to imparting hands-on training to students in copywriting and advertisement, it also provides them exposure to the international media scenario through movies, DVDs etc.
- 13. Book Stall** – The store provides stationery as well as services such as photocopying, printing etc. and also acts as a refreshment stall which serve snacks and beverages for both faculty and students at an affordable price



- 14. Canteen**– Two well-furnished and spacious canteens (main canteen & cafeteria near MSW block) which operate during the college working hours offer students with a wide variety of snacks and meals at subsidised and affordable prices, and they foster the health and well-being of all the members of the college.
- 15. College Chapel** – The College chapel is a place of prayer and provides a peaceful space for quiet reflection and solitude in the midst of the day to day stresses of student life. Class liturgies and Staff Mass find a distinctively sacred home here along with regular First Friday Mass.
- 16. Gandhi Square** – The lush green open space situated amidst the various department buildings serves as a much-needed refuge for the students during the break hours. The white bust of the great Mahatma Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, adorns the central spot of the open courtyard, giving it the popular name-of Gandhi square. The pathway leading to it canopied on both sides by luscious bamboo groves, is known for serving as the favourite spot for photography during festive days of celebrations for both the staff and students.
- 17. Hostel** – The College provides hostel facilities for boys of the self financing section. The rules and regulations are planned to help the students to be able to use their freedom wisely and at the same time practice self-discipline. The girl students are provided residential accommodation at five well furnished convent hostels
- 18. Counselling Room** – The counselling room located on the ground floor of the Commerce Aided block provides a safe, relaxed and confidential environment to work through individual challenges and stresses of the students and staff. Counselling Cell works with students to help improve self-awareness, gain independence and skills to handle difficult situations.
- 19. Instrumentation Facility Centre** – Instrumentation facility centre provides facility to do research analysis of various materials using various instrument facility with the proper technical assistance of a technical assistant. The centre consists of 3 rooms and 2 computers. All rooms in the instrumentation facility centre are provided with LED lighting facility mounted in the false ceiling and many racks for setting the instrument and sample storage.



20. **Bank / ATM** – A branch of the SBT with ATM facility is functioning in the premises of the college.
21. **Server Room** – Server room is located on the first floor of the main building of the campus. The room has solid walls extending from the floor to ceiling. Physical access to the server room is limited to only one person who has legitimate responsibilities justifying such access.
22. **Public Address System** – Communications are passed over to the students via the public address system provided in the class rooms and and public places on the campus.
23. **Sports and Games Facilities** – Athletic tracks, Cricket ground with a tournament class pitch, standard basketball court, Football ground, two badminton court, sporting equipment, kits and sportswear for the team members, Yoga centre, Gymnasium.
24. **Botanical Garden** – Botanical Garden helps to create interest in flora among students. They act as an out-door laboratory which conserves flora in natural habitat. It is enriched with ornamental as well as medicinal plants, ferns and trees. Most of them display variety of flowers which attract insects, birds and butterflies.
25. **Herbal Garden** – A dedicated space devoted to growing a specific group of plants called herbs or medicinal plants, tended by the Chemistry department has a collection of indigenous and rare herbs and medicinal plants used for pharmaceutical purposes. Apart from that, these plants also play a critical role in the health and well-being of the community.
26. **Vermicompost Unit** – Vermicompost is a method to recycle organic wastes and to produce quality compost. Red earthworm is the preferred species of earthworm because of its high multiplication rate and convert ability to the organic matter into vermicompost within 45-50 days. The casts are rich in nutrients, growth promoting substances, beneficial to soil and micro flora and having properties inhibit pathogenic microbes. The stable, fine granular organic manure thus obtained is utilized for campus flora seedlings and crop production.
27. **Computer Lab** – The campus houses multiple computer labs functioning in varied capacities. All the labs are equipped with computer systems, tables, cushioned chairs, and overhead projectors. The air-conditioned



rooms are well-maintained and wi-fi enabled. They are equipped to serve as language labs, common computer centres, and digital libraries. The labs situated at various points of the campus serve as venues for a wide variety of training sessions and classes.

- 28. Anatomy Lab** – The Department of Zoology has an anatomy lab with a seating capacity of 40 students and 20 large tables for students to perform dissections and other practical experiments like titration, biochemical analysis etc. The lab is provided with 4 wash basins for students to collect water for dissection and also for various analyses and for cleaning the glassware after use. In addition, the department has a Physiology laboratory where chemicals and all the reagents, glassware etc. used for various experiments are kept.
- 29. Guest Room** – The college offers the delegates/visitors the best facility in terms of service, clean and hygienic ambience, and a pleasant stay with a well-furnished air-conditioned room. The room well-equipped with all the necessary amenities, such as television, telephone, internet access etc. is required for a quality stay.
- 30. Faculty Room** – The spacious, carpeted room next to the IQAC, equipped with tables, chairs and the subtle necessities of comfort serves as the recreation room for the teaching faculty of the institution. The space provides a wide assortment of newspapers and magazines for the teachers to choose from and read in leisure. In addition. the recreation space open to the male and female staff alike.
- 31. Radio BMC** – Bharata Mata College Thrikkakkara established Radio BMC in 2019, an innovative student-run radio station providing practical experience in radio jockeying and sound recording. A dedicated studio, open on all working days, allows students to manage the entire production process, from content creation to broadcasting. The station's reach is extended through a student-developed app and campus-wide speakers, making programs accessible to the wider college community. Radio BMC serves as a valuable training ground for aspiring radio jockeys, offering real-world experience in broadcasting. This initiative highlights the college's commitment to fostering a creative, hands-on learning environment beyond the classroom.



- 32. Examination Block (RUSA Funded)** The Examination Block is a three-storey building designed to ensure the smooth and secure conduct of exams. It is modernised with various specialized equipment and technologies to handle all aspects of the examination process, from question paper preparation to secure storage of answer scripts and evaluation. There is a question paper printing room with restricted entry via biometric access to ensure that only authorized personnel enter the room. This room is equipped with a high-speed, secure printer that can handle large volumes of paper while maintaining confidentiality. Continuous CCTV monitoring prevents any unauthorized activities. Additionally, there is a strong-room designed to store answer sheets and other sensitive examination materials.
- 33. Rain Water Harvesting** – It conserves rainwater by collecting, storing, conveying and purifying of rainwater that runs off from rooftops, roads, open grounds, etc. for later use.
- 34. Toilet** – Toilets are available in every block. These include 8 toilets for staff and 40 toilets for students. The ladies toilet block houses napkin vendor and incinerator.
- 35. Lift** – The college has 2 lifts to facilitate the movement of people and other resources up and down across floors.
- 36. Parking** – The student parking space on the campus is approximately 30,000 sq. feet with a capacity of parking around 40 cars and 180 motor bikes. It is located behind the main building of the college.
- 37. MBA Auditorium-** The college boasts of a multi-facility fully air-conditioned auditorium with a seating capacity of 300. It consists of a well-equipped stage, attractive lights with the provision of world class acoustic system. Two green rooms, an array of washrooms, ample storage, work and parking space make it a converging point of, academic space, cultural hub and utility. It serves as the venue for various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The auditorium is also open to the local community for their various needs.
