III. THE EMBLEM

A hand beside an open book extends to it a burning torch, dedicating the symbolic torch of learning to 'God and Country'. The flaming heart at the right signifies the unconditional love and compassion of Blessed Virgin Mary - the Heavenly Mother and divine patron of the college, who instils in all her children, a burning desire for true wisdom and consuming love for fellow-beings. The crown on top of Bharata Mata symbolizes the heavenly glory of the Blessed Mother as well as the rich and regal heritage of our motherland. Rays cascade on the entire shield from an Omniscient Eye denoting the all-encompassing protection and love of the Almighty, thus placing the college under His See. It also represents the showers of blessings which dispel the darkness of ignorance, untruth and mortality and which lead to the light of wisdom, truth and crowning glory. A scroll at the bottom of the shield unveils the motto of the college - 'For God and Country'.



IV. BHARATA MATA COLLEGE - A PROFILE

Bharata Mata College is a nationally accredited first grade arts and science co-educational institution of higher learning in the aided sector, under Bharata Mata Educational Trust owned and managed by the Archdiocese of Ernakulam-Angamaly. Established in 1965 by His Eminence the late Joseph Cardinal Parecattil, the college is affiliated to the Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam. The college was included under section 2 (f) and 12 (b) of UGC Act 1956 in 1976 and re-accredited at the A+ level by NAAC in 2019.

The college is located in Thrikkakara, Kerala's mythological capital, facing the Seaport - Airport Road. Situated at a distance of just 12 Kms from the city of Kochi, it is easily accessible from Judgemukku on Edappally-Muvattupuzha Road in the North, and from NGO Quarters and Palli stop on the Kakkanad-Ernakulam Road in the South, in addition to the BMC bus stop on the Seaport-Airport Road. The CUSAT, NPOL, Model Engineering College, Ernakulam District Collectorate, Infopark and CSEZ are the important neighbouring landmarks of the college.

Though it has a semi-urban location, Bharata Mata College largely caters to the higher education aspirations of socially, educationally and economically marginalized sections of a rural population belonging to different communities. More than 65% of the student community are girls. Started in 1965 as a junior college with five Pre-degree batches, the college today boasts of being a first grade college with 15 under graduate programmes, 8 post-graduate programmes including 1 Integrated PG programme and 2 professional PG programmes, 3 research centres and an off-campus centre.

The community comprises 2630 students, 118 teachers and 36 members of the non-teaching staff. The dedication of the management and the community, combined with excellent infrastructural and teaching facilities help maintain high standards in curricular and co-curricular spheres of the institution.

In keeping with the lofty vision of its founder, Bharata Mata College is a melting-pot of students from all communities and creeds, thus preserving a secular character while promoting the Christian ideal of love and service.

XII. CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM

DURATION

The duration of U.G. programmes shall be **6 semesters**. The duration of odd semesters shall be from **June to October** and that of even semesters from **November to March**. There shall be three days semester break after odd semesters and two months vacation during April and May in every academic year. A student may be permitted to complete the Programme, on valid reasons, within a period of 12 continuous semesters from the date of commencement of the first semester of the programme.

SCHEME AND SYLLABUS

The U.G. programmes shall include (a) Common courses I & II, (b) Core courses, (c) Complementary Courses, (d) Open Course.

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

There shall be a maximum of three credits for the open course and remaining one credit should be shifted to choice based course or any other core course.

EXAMINATIONS

The evaluation of each course shall contain two parts:

- Internal or In-Semester Assessment (ISA)
- External or End-Semester Assessment (ESA)



The internal to external assessment ratio shall be 1:4, for both courses with or without practical. There shall be a maximum of 80 marks for external evaluation and maximum of **20** marks for internal evaluation. For all courses (theory & practical), grades are given on a 07-point scale based on the total percentage of marks. **(ISA+ESA)** as given below.

Note: A separate minimum of 30% marks each for internal and external (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 40% are required for a pass for a course. For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of Grade **E** is required for all the individual courses. Candidate who secures **E** grade and above will be eligible for higher studies.

ATTENDANCE EVALUATION

For all courses without practical: 90% and above: 5 marks, 85-90%: 4 marks, 80-84%: 3 marks, 76-79%: 2 marks, 75%: 1 mark.

For all courses with practical (Theory): 90% and above: 3 marks, 80-89%: 2 marks, 75-79%: 1 mark.

For all courses with practical (Practical): 90% and above: 4 marks, 85-89%: 3 marks, 80-84%: 2 marks, 75-79%: 1 mark.

ASSIGNMENTS

At least one assignment should be done in each semester (from first to fourth semesters) for each course.

SEMINAR/VIVA

A student shall present a seminar in the fifth semester and appear for viva-voce in the sixth semester.

TEST PAPER

At least one internal test-paper is to be attended in each semester for each course.

All students are to do a **project**. The report of the project in duplicate is to be submitted to the department at the sixth semester and are to be produced before the examiners appointed by the University.

There will be no supplementary exams. For reappearance/ improvement, the students can appear along with the next batch. A student who registers his/her name for the external exam for a semester will be eligible for promotion to the next semester. A student who has completed the entire curriculum requirement, but could not register for the Semester examination can register notionally, for getting eligibility for promotion to the next semester. A candidate who has not



secured minimum marks/credits in internal examinations can re-do the same registering along with the University examination for the same semester, subsequently.

POST GRADUATE PROGRAMMES (AIDED)

Duration: The duration of PG Programmes shall be 4 semesters.

Examinations: There shall be University examination at the end of each semester. Practical examinations shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester or at the end of even semesters as prescribed in the syllabus of the particular programme. Project evaluation and Viva-Voce shall be conducted at the end of the programme only. Practical examination, project evaluation and Viva-Vice shall be conducted by two external examiners and one internal examiner. There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration in each lecture based course and practical course. A question paper may contain short answer type/annotation, short essay type questions/problems and long essay type questions. Different types of questions shall have different weightage.

Evaluation: The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) End Semester Evaluation(ESE) (External Evaluation) and (b) Continuous Evaluation(CE)(Internal Evaluation). 25% weightage shall be given to internal evaluation and the remaining 75% to external evaluation and the ratio and weightage between internal and external is 1:3. Both End Semester Evaluation (ESE) and Continuous Evaluation(CE) shall be carried out using direct grading system.

Direct Grading: The direct grading for CE (Internal) and ESE (External Evaluation) shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values of 5, 4,3,2, 1 and 0 respectively.

Grade Point Average (GPA): Internal and External components are separately graded and the combined grade point with weightage 1 for internal and 3 for external shall be applied to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA) of each course. Letter grade shall be assigned to each course based on the categorization provided in the following table.

A separate minimum of C grade is required for a pass for both internal evaluation and external evaluation for every course. A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the examination along with the next batch. For the successful completion of semester, a student should pass all courses and score a minimum SGPA (semester grade point average) of 2.0. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of her/his SGPA.

Internal evaluation:

The internal evaluation shall be based on predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars, lab skills, records, viva-voce etc.

XIV. FEE AND SCHOLARSHIPS

A. TUITION FEE

Students can either make a complete payment of tuition fees or in instalments at the beginning of each semester on dates notified by the College office. If the fees are not paid on the due dates, a fine of Rs. 5 or Rs. 10 will be charged on other dates specified. If the fee and the fine are not paid even by this last date, the defaulter's name will be removed from the regular rolls of the college and entered in the defaulters' register.

These students will not get the benefit of attendance till they are readmitted, even if they attend classes regularly during this period. To get readmitted, parents of students have to apply for the special permission of the Principal besides having to remit all the arrears of fees with fine. A receipt signed by the accountant should be secured for all such payments. There will not be a readmission fee. But students should remember that they will be admitted to the second semester only if the first semester dues are cleared and to the third semester only if the second semester dues are cleared.

Students from scheduled tribes, scheduled castes and backward communities admitted on the strength of income certificate from the revenue authorities, will not be allowed to leave the college during the first semester unless all the fees of that semester are paid. This amount will be refunded if and when the grant in respect of such students is sanctioned by the Government.

** The special fees notified in the schedule of fees should be paid in the first year during admission and in subsequent years along with the first instalment of tuition fee. Tuition fee can be remitted either in lump at the beginning of the year or each term. The fee defaulters will be removed from the roll and they will not get attendance even if they attend the class. Fee defaulters are liable to pay Rs. 50/- towards re-admission fee in addition to fine.*

C. CAUTION DEPOSIT

Students are also requested to remit the caution deposit prescribed for their particular course, along with the first terminal fees. Caution deposit is a security for using the invested property of the management and shall be refunded at the end of a particular course of study, after the deduction of all dues, if any, to the college. To claim refund students should apply for the same in a prescribed form and produce the original receipt. Caution deposit should be claimed before the reopening date of the ensuing academic year.

Students belonging to SC/ST/OBC are exempted from payment of the caution deposit. But other backward communities should pay the caution deposit.

D. FEE CONCESSION

Students belonging to the scheduled castes/scheduled tribes, OBC and OEC are eligible for fee concession, granted by the Harijan Welfare Department. OBC students will have to produce an income certificate from the village officer. Children of all registered fishermen are eligible for educational concessions from the fisheries department subject to conditions laid down for other eligible communities.



Students who are children of the Kerala Govt. servants who have died in harness or within six months after retirement will be eligible for full fee concession provided their guardian's annual income is below Rs. 4,000.

Students who are children and grandchildren of political sufferers are also entitled to educational concession provided their annual income does not exceed Rs. 15,000/-

Students belonging to the forward communities too are eligible for the fee concession under The Kumara Pillai Commission Report. The concession is purely on means basis. The annual income should not exceed Rs. 1,00,000/-

E. SCHOLARSHIPS

1. National Loan Scholarship

NLS is given to Indian nationals for the courses after Matriculation or SSLC leading to the first degree. Those with 50% aggregate marks in the qualifying examination are eligible. The income limit is Rs. 25,000/-. There is no income limit for the PG students. Undergraduate students who get scholarship/stipend under any of the other schemes are not eligible. The form of application may be obtained from the DCE Trivandrum on payment of Rs. 2/-.

2. National Merit Scholarship

This scholarship is awarded strictly on the basis of merit. If the income exceeds Rs. 25,000/- per annum, a certificate of merit and a national prize of Rs. 100/- will be awarded.

3. National Merit Scholarship for the Children of Primary and Secondary School Teachers

These scholarships will be awarded to the children of serving teachers only according to merit and availability.

4. Scholarship to Physically Handicapped Students

The candidates should secure at least 40% marks at the previous annual examination. The income should not exceed Rs. 24,000/- per annum.

5. State Scholarships

Students who have secured not less than 60% marks for the qualifying examinations and whose parents' annual income does not exceed Rs. 7,500/-, Rs. 10,000/-, Rs. 12,000/- for the UG and PG Courses respectively are eligible to apply.

6. University Merit Scholarship

Awarded by the University strictly on merit basis, subjectwise.



7. Travancore Temple Entry Proclamation Memorial Scholarship only for SC/ST students who have secured first class for SSLC.

Students who have secured not less than 60% marks in the qualifying examination are eligible to apply for the above scholarship.

8. State Scholarship to Muslim Nadar girl student

Income limit below Rs. 8,000/- per annum.

9. Mar. George Cardinal Alencherry Scholarship

Cardinal Alencherry Scholarship- The Merit Scholarship comprises a cash award of Rs. 10,000/- (Rupees Ten Thousands) each and a Certificate conferred to 15 students undergoing final year degree programme.

XV. CAMPUS FACILITIES & AMENITIES

1. **Cardinal Parecattil Auditorium** – With a seating capacity of 1500 people, the fully air - conditioned auditorium caters to the general academic & cultural assembly of the community.
2. **Mar Augustine Kandathil Students' Hall** – The Students' Hall which can accomodate 300 students at a time is meant for conducting departmental functions, club activities and meetings of various student support organisation.
3. **Seminar Halls** – There are four seminar halls - Mar Louis Pazhaparambil hall, Mar. Antony Cardinal Padiyara Seminar hall, Mar. Sebastian Mankuzhikari seminar hall, Mar Abraham Kattumana conference hall - in total in the different blocks with audio-visual facilities for seminars and conferences of an exclusive nature.
4. **Examination Halls** - Mar. Jacob Manathodath examination hall and Mar. Varkey Cardinal Vithayathil examination hall are used for UG & PG examinations.



5. **Library** – The college library with a collection of over 40,000 books and a subscription of about 100 periodicals and journals, is the key source of academic assistance to the community. There are special sections for reading, lending and reference. Internet browsing is also available. For the sake of convenience, each department maintains a department library too. The library is fully computerized and digitalized with Machine Readable Catalogue facility for searching and Bar-coding for detection and transparency.
6. **Computer Centre** – offers short term courses in MS Office, Visual Basics & DTP. Internet browsing is available to the college community free of cost as the campus is wire-free.
7. **Language Lab** – There are two language labs – one in the Main Block and the other in the MBA Block which facilitate students to fine tune their communication skills.
8. **Media Lab** – A full fledged media lab of the Malayalam Copywriting Course with NXG Camera, editing software, digital recorders and related facilities is the first of its kind in the state associated with an arts department. In addition to imparting hands-on training to students in copywriting and advertisement, it also provides them exposure to the international media scenario through movies, DVDs etc.
9. **Book Stall** – The college book stall supplies books and stationery to the community at subsidized rates.
10. **Canteen** – The college canteen caters to the nutritional needs of the staff and students at subsidized rates. The canteen functions from **7.30 am to 9.30 am., 11.30 am to 2 pm. & 3.30 pm. to 5.00 pm.**
11. **Hostel** – The girl students are provided residential accommodation at five well equipped convent hostels.
12. **Multi Gym** – The fitness centre provides recreation as well as physical well being to the students.
13. **Bank / ATM** – A branch of the SBT with ATM facility is functioning in the premises of the college.
14. **EPABX with 100 lines capacity** – keep all the departments, the Principals's Office and the Office connected.
15. **Photocopier** – Photocopying services at subsidized rates are available at the Book Store, and Reception.



16. **Public Address System** – Communications are passed over to the students via the public address system provided in the class rooms and the public places in the campus.
17. **Sports and Games facilities** – include 400 meters Track & Field, Basket Ball Court, Volley Ball Court, Shuttle Badminton Court, Football Field, Fitness Centre, Table Tennis etc.
18. **Botanical Garden** – The botanical garden has a collection of rare herbs, shrubs, plants and trees.
19. **Herbal Garden** – tended by the Chemistry department has a collection of indigenous and rare herbs and medicinal plants used for pharmaceutical purposes.

XVII. RULES OF ATTENDANCE AND GENERAL BEHAVIOUR

True to the motto 'For God & Country', BMC endeavours to train young students who enter its portals to grow into men and women of integrity and ability and loyal citizens of the city of God and our motherland. The rules and regulations of the college and the supervision of the staff and management are means to achieve these ideals rather than restriction on personal freedom.

1. Students and Staff of the college shall co-operate with the college authorities to ensure a peaceful atmosphere congenial to the academic activities and overall development of the students and for the maintenance of discipline in the campus.
2. The College timing is from 8.30 am to 3.30 pm and regular classes will be conducted from 8.30 a.m. to 1.30 p.m. Students should on no account arrive late to the classroom. At the stroke of the third bell, students should stand up in silence for the morning prayer.
3. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period by the teacher-in-charge of the class.
4. **A student is required to secure 75% attendance in order to be eligible for university examinations or to contest in elections. If absent for more than three days, the parent will be asked to meet the HOD.**
5. **Absence from class for an hour will be considered as absence for the entire session concerned. Absence for 2 or more hours will be treated as absence for one full day.**
6. Absence must be regularised by a leave letter without which attendance shortage will not get condonation at the university level. (The format is available in the college store.) Students can apply for condonation upto 10 days. **Condonation will be granted twice during a course.**
7. Application for leave, countersigned by the parent/guardian/warden should be submitted to the Principal in person.
8. When leave of absence is required in case of illness for more than three consecutive days, application for the same must be supported by a medical certificate.
9. A student absenting himself/herself without leave for more than ten consecutive working days will have his/her name removed from the rolls. He will be readmitted only on payment of all fee dues with fine.



10. Students should leave the campus by 5.00 pm. in the evening
11. Students are expected to be clean and decorous in dress, language and behaviour. Students are not allowed to wear shorts, short tops, sleeveless tops inside the campus. Boys should not grow long hair or beard.
12. Students are permitted in the campus during holidays only with the presence of a teacher.
13. Students are to make use of the library during free hours and shall not loiter about on the verandas or corridors of the college.
14. Students shall use the property of the college with care and keep the building and furniture clean.
15. Any student who is persistently insolent, or insubordinate or who wilfully and repeatedly commits mischief or is guilty of fraud or malpractice or who in the opinion of the Principal is likely to have an unwholesome influence on his fellow students or tarnish the reputation of the institution shall be removed from the rolls. The removal shall be either temporary or permanent subject to the gravity of the misconduct.
16. Misbehaviour from any member of the College Community towards girl students, use or threat of violence against the members of the staff, physical violence or mental abuse on fellow students, drunkenness, use of drugs and smoking inside the campus will be considered very serious cases of misconduct warranting disciplinary action including dismissal.
17. **Ragging is a very serious criminal offence under Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998 and is punishable with 2 years imprisonment along with a penalty of Rs. 10,000/-. Students committing the offence will be expelled from the institution and they shall not be given admission to any other educational institution for a period of 3 years from the date of expulsion. (Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998).**
18. **Students should wear their photo-pasted identity cards while on campus. Students who fail to do so will lose their attendance for the day.**
19. Students are not permitted to keep their belongings in the security cabin or other common areas.
20. Fee concession to SC/ST students will be granted only on the basis of their monthly attendance in class.
21. A student engaged in Union activities or other activities assigned by the college may be given an attendance concession for maximum 10 days only.



22. Under no circumstance, students undergoing disciplinary action will be allowed in the campus. They will not be permitted to attend or take part in the public functions of the college or to participate in the study tours of the department.
23. Students/teams authorized by the college and principal alone will be permitted to take part in the University Youth Festival/Intercollegiate Fests.
24. Prior written sanctions is to be taken from the Principal for all seminars, fests, talks conducted by the departments/clubs etc. and of the guests to be invited, including that of the College Union activities.
25. 5000 watts is the maximum sound permitted in the sound systems.
26. Intercollegiate Fests are to be permitted on Fridays and Saturdays only. Cinematic Dance, Fashion Show and DJs are not permitted. Road Shows and Treasure Hunt not to be permitted during working days.
27. Students are not permitted to enter or sit in other classes.
28. Performing cinematic dances and fashion shows within Educational Institutions is also prohibited by the Government vide G.O. No. 346/05 H.E. dated 1-3-05.
29. All expressions of activities which are immoral, antisocial, communal and antinational are strictly prohibited in the college campus.
30. Only vehicles bearing the stickers issued by Road Safety Club will be allowed to be parked inside the campus
31. During college hours the gates will be open for vehicles only during lunch break.
32. Unauthorised entry of outsiders into the campus is strictly prohibited. Unless permitted in by writing the college authorities, students shall not bring or entertain outsiders within the campus during working hours and during the college functions.
33. No vehicle is allowed to ply through the campus during college hours. Entry and exit of two-wheelers are allowed only through the northern gate of the college until further notice. Vehicles are expected to be parked only in the space provided for the purpose.
34. Nobody shall collect money from others either by request or by coercion or buy and sell any article in the college campus except with specific permission of the Principal.



35. It is forbidden to organize or attend meetings other than the official ones which are specifically permitted by the Principal. **No political activity shall be permitted in the campus. Strong disciplinary action will be taken against those who break these rules.**
36. **Use of mobile phones by students inside the campus is strictly prohibited as per Government Order R.T. No. 346/05 H.E. dated 1-3-05. A fine of Rs.500 will be charged for the use of mobiles in the campus; on repeated action the phones will be confiscated till the end of the semester.**
37. It is not permitted to distribute or circulate any notice, pamphlet, leaflet etc. within the campus or exhibit any type of banners, flags, posters, notices etc. within the campus without prior sanction of the Principal. Announcements and notices signed by the teacher-in-charge/HOD and countersigned by the Principal only will be entertained in the classrooms.
38. It is not permitted to stick bills, posters or scribble on any part of the building, compound wall, any wall, black boards or furniture. Damage to college property will warrant strong disciplinary action.
39. The campus is a **smoke-free zone**. Smoking or selling cigarettes and other tobacco products and drugs in an area within a radius of 100 yards of the Educational Institution is prohibited vide GO No. 822/05/H Edn. dt. 12.05.2005.
40. Students are to abide by the motto- **Clean Campus Green Campus**. Campus is following the Govt. Instruction to undergo green protocol. So it is advised to avoid plastic items such as Flex, banners, cups etc.
41. Instructions for students appearing for examinations:
 - The students are expected to be present in the exam hall 15 minutes before the bell; those who reach after the bell will not be allowed to enter.
 - The students should collect their hall ticket on the day before the examination; in case of some technical errors in getting the hall ticket from the university, the students themselves should carry out the necessary formalities.
 - The students should bring their hall ticket and college id card to the exam hall; if missing/lost, a fine of Rs 100/ should be remitted at the office to get the provisional id card/ hall ticket.



- The students are not expected to carry mobile phones, bags, writing boards, pouches, pictures or any such materials to the examination hall.
- If caught for malpractices in the exam hall, corrective measures like banning from writing examinations will be taken.
- In case the student wants to write the exam in a separate room due to some physical ailments, it should be informed to the exam controller in advance.

KERALA RAGGING PROHIBITION ACT 1998

കേരള സംസ്ഥാനത്തെ വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനങ്ങളിൽ റാഗിംഗ് നിരോധിച്ചുകൊണ്ടുള്ള 1998-ലെ കേരള റാഗിംഗ് നിരോധന ആക്ടിന്റെ പ്രസക്തഭാഗങ്ങൾ വിദ്യാർത്ഥികളുടേയും രക്ഷകർത്താക്കളുടേയും അറിവിലേയ്ക്കായി താഴെ കൊടുക്കുന്നു. ഒരു വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയോട് ക്രമവിരുദ്ധമായ പെരുമാറ്റം മൂലം വിദ്യാർത്ഥിക്ക് ശാരീരികമോ മാനസികമോ ആയ പീഡനം ഉണ്ടാകുന്നതോ ഉണ്ടാകാൻ സാധ്യതയുള്ളതോ അല്ലെങ്കിൽ ഭയാശങ്കയോ, ഭയപ്പാടോ, അപമാനമോ, ബുദ്ധിമുട്ടോ ഉണ്ടാകുന്നതോ ആയ ഏതെങ്കിലും പ്രവൃത്തി ചെയ്യൽ എന്നർത്ഥമാക്കുന്നതും അതിൽ :

1. അങ്ങനെയുള്ള വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയെ ശല്യപ്പെടുത്തുന്നതോ അധിക്ഷേപിക്കുന്നതോ, പരിഹസിക്കുന്നതോ ഉപദ്രവിക്കുന്നതോ, അല്ലെങ്കിൽ
2. ഒരു വിദ്യാർത്ഥി സാധാരണ ഗതിയിൽ സ്വമനസ്സാലെ ചെയ്യാൻ ഒരുമ്പെടാത്ത ഏതെങ്കിലും പ്രവൃത്തി ചെയ്യുന്നതിനോ നിർവ്വഹിക്കുന്നതിനോ ആവശ്യപ്പെടുന്നതോ ഉൾപ്പെടുന്നതാകുന്നു.
3. റാഗിംഗ് നിരോധനം: ഏതൊരു വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിന്റെയും അകത്തും പുറത്തും റാഗിംഗ് നിരോധിച്ചിരിക്കുന്നു.
4. റാഗിംഗിനുള്ള ശിക്ഷ: ഏതെങ്കിലും വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിനകത്തോ അഥവാ പുറത്തോ റാഗിംഗ് നടത്തുകയോ റാഗിംഗിൽ പങ്കെടുക്കുകയോ അതിനു പ്രേരിപ്പിക്കുകയോ അല്ലെങ്കിൽ റാഗിംഗ് പ്രചരിപ്പിക്കുകയോ ചെയ്യുന്ന ഏതൊരാളും കുറ്റസ്ഥാപനത്തിനുമേൽ, രണ്ടു വർഷം വരെയോ കഠിനമായ കാര്യമായവിലേക്ക് തടവു ശിക്ഷ നൽകി ശിക്ഷിക്കപ്പെടേണ്ടതും അയാൾ പതിനായിരം രൂപ വരെയോകാവുന്ന പിഴ ശിക്ഷയ്ക്കും കൂടി വിധേയനാകേണ്ടതാണ്.
5. വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയെ പിരിച്ചുവിടൽ: 4-ാം വകുപ്പിൻ കീഴിലുള്ള ഒരു കുറ്റത്തിന് ശിക്ഷിക്കപ്പെടുന്ന ഏതൊരു വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയെയും വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിൽ നിന്നും പിരിച്ചുവിടേണ്ടതും അങ്ങനെയുള്ള വിദ്യാർത്ഥിക്ക് പിരിച്ചുവിടൽ ഉത്തരവ് പുറപ്പെടുവിച്ച തീയതി മുതൽ മൂന്നുവർഷക്കാലത്തേക്ക്, മറ്റു യാതൊരു വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിലും പ്രവേശനം നൽകാൻ പാടില്ലാത്തതാകുന്നു.



6. വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയെ സസ്പെൻഡു ചെയ്യൽ: മുൻ പറഞ്ഞ വ്യവസ്ഥകൾക്ക് ഭംഗം വരാതെ ഒരു വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിന്റെ മേധാവിയോട് റാഗിംഗിനെക്കുറിച്ച് ഏതെങ്കിലും വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയോ, അതതു സംഗതിപോലെ, മാതാ പിതാക്കളോ, രക്ഷകർത്താവോ, അഥവാ ആ വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിലെ ഏതെങ്കിലും അദ്ധ്യാപകനോ രേഖാമൂലം പരാതിപ്പെട്ടാൽ ആ വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിന്റെ മേധാവി, പരാതി ലഭിച്ചു ഏഴാം ദിവസത്തിനകം പരാതിയിൽ പറഞ്ഞിരിക്കുന്ന സംഗതിയെ സംബന്ധിച്ച് അന്വേഷണം നടത്തേണ്ടതും, പ്രഥമദൃഷ്ട്യാ സത്യമുണ്ടെന്നു കണ്ടാൽ കുറ്റാരോപണ വിധേയനായ വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയെ സസ്പെൻഡ് ചെയ്യേണ്ടതും ഉടൻ തന്നെ പ്രസ്തുത പരാതി ആ വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനം സ്ഥിതി ചെയ്യുന്ന പ്രദേശത്ത് ആധികാരികതയുള്ള പോലീസ് സ്റ്റേഷനിലേക്ക് മേൽ നടപടിക്കായി അയച്ചുകൊടുക്കേണ്ടതാകുന്നു.

XVIII. LIBRARY RULES

1. Library is a place for serious study and research. So strict silence is to be maintained.
2. The library will be open from 9.00 am to 5 pm on all working days and Saturdays. (except public holidays and second Saturdays)
3. Identity card is compulsory for entering the library.
4. Books are issued against the library membership cards on all working days till 4 pm.
5. Reference books and periodicals will not be issued for home reading.
6. Students must examine the books taken by them and report to the librarian if the books are in a damaged condition before taking them away.
7. Any book lost or damaged, must be replaced with the same one or latest edition. (in case of multi-volume set, complete set should be replaced).
8. The library card must be returned on the completion of the course. In case of loss of membership card, a fine of Rs 50/ will be charged and a fresh card will be issued against an application in writing to the librarian.
9. Circulation Rules: The loan period is 14 working days for all categories of readers. Renewal is possible only one time and it is for 7 days only. UG – 2 Books, PG - 4 Books, Research Scholar – 5 Books, Faculty – 10 Books, Guest faculty – 5 Books, Non teaching staff - 3 books.
10. All the readers should submit their library books during vacations and continuous leave in the college.
11. Failure to submit the books on or before the due date you will be charged a fine of Rs: 1/ per day per book till you return.
12. No due certificate should be collected from the library on retirement/expiry of contract/course completion/course discontinuation etc.
