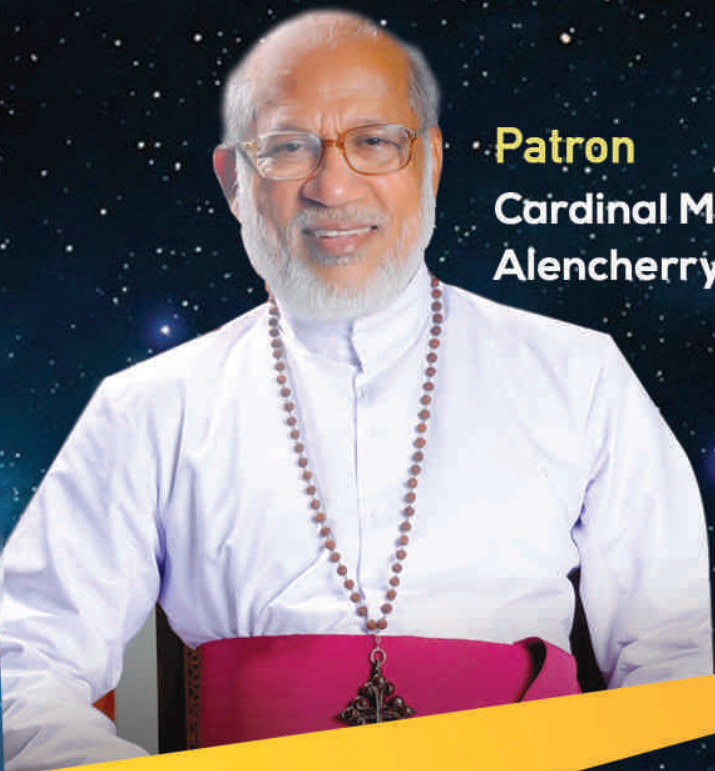

## FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS OF INDIAN CITIZENS

### Right to Equality (Articles 14-18)

Article 14 : Equality before law

The State shall not deny to any person equality before the law or the equal protection of the laws within the territory of India.

Article 15 : Prohibition of discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex or place of birth

Article 16 : Equality of opportunity in matters of public employment

Article 17 : Abolition of Untouchability

Article 18 : Abolition of titles

### Right to Freedom (Articles 19-22)

Article 19 : Protection of certain rights regarding freedom of speech, etc.

All citizens shall have the right—

(a) to freedom of speech and expression;

(b) to assemble peaceably and without arms;

(c) to form associations or unions;

(d) to move freely throughout the territory of India;

(e) to reside and settle in any part of the territory of India; and

(f) to practice any profession, or to carry on any occupation, trade or business.

Article 20 : Protection in respect of conviction for offenses

Article 21 : Protection of life and personal liberty

Article 21A : Right to education

Article 22 : Protection against arrest and detention in certain cases

### Right Against Exploitation (Articles 23-24)

Article 23 : Prohibition of traffic in human beings and forced labour

Article 24 : Prohibition of employment of children in factories, etc.

### Right to Freedom of Religion (Articles 25-28):

Article 25 : Freedom of conscience and free profession, practice and propagation of religion

Article 26 : Freedom to manage religious affairs

Article 27 : Freedom as to payment of taxes for promotion of any particular religion

Article 28 : Freedom as to attendance at religious instruction or religious worship in certain educational institutions

### Cultural and Educational Rights (Articles 29-30):

Article 29 : Protection of interests of minorities

Article 30 : Right of minorities to establish and administer educational institutions

Right to Constitutional Remedies (Article 32):

Article 32 : The Supreme Court shall have power to issue directions or orders or writs, including writs in the nature of habeas corpus, mandamus, prohibition, quo warranto and certiorari.

- e. to promote harmony and the spirit of common brotherhood amongst all the people of India transcending religious, linguistic and regional diversities, to renounce practices derogatory to the dignity of women;
- f. to value and preserve the rich heritage of our composite culture;
- g. to protect and improve the natural environment including forests, lakes, rivers, and wild-life and to have compassion for living creatures;
- h. to develop the scientific temper, humanism and the spirit of inquiry and reform;
- i. to safeguard public property and to abjure violence;
- j. to ' Strive towards excellence in all spheres of individual and collective activity, so that the nation constantly rises to higher levels of endeavour and achievement.
- k. who is a parent or guardian, to provide opportunities for education to his child, or as the case may be, ward between the age of six and fourteen years.

## I. BHARATA MATA COLLEGE - A PROFILE

Bharata Mata College is a nationally accredited first grade Arts and Science co-educational institution of higher learning in the aided sector, under Bharata Mata Educational Trust owned and managed by the Archdiocese of Ernakulam-Angamaly. Established in 1965 by His Eminence the late Joseph Cardinal Parecattil, the college is affiliated to the Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam. The college was included under section 2 (f) and 12 (B) of UGC Act 1956 in 1976 and re-accredited at the A+ level by NAAC in 2019.

The college is located in Thrikkakara, Kerala's mythological capital, facing the Seaport - Airport Road. Situated at a distance of 12 Kms from the city of Kochi, it is easily accessible from Judgemukku on Edappally Muvattupuzha Road in the North, and from NGO Quarters and Palli stop on the Kakkanad-Ernakulam Road in the South, in addition to the BMC bus stop on the Seaport-Airport Road. The CUSAT, NPOL, Model Engineering College, Ernakulam District Collectorate, Infopark and CSEZ are the important neighbouring landmarks of the college.

Though situated in an increasingly urban location, Bharata Mata College largely caters to the higher education aspirations of socially, educationally and economically marginalized sections of a rural population belonging to different communities. More than 65% of the student community are girls. Started in 1965 as a junior college with five Pre-degree batches, the college today boasts of being a firstgrade college with 15 Under graduate programmes, 8 Post-graduate programmes including 1 Integrated PG programme and 2 Professional PG programmes, 4 Research centres and an Off-campus centre.

The community comprises of 2691 students, 132 teachers and 44 members of the non-teaching staff. The dedication of the management and the community, combined with excellent infrastructural and teaching facilities help maintain high standards in curricular and co-curricular spheres of the institution.

In keeping with the lofty vision of its founder, Bharata Mata College is an melting-pot of students from all communities and creeds, thus preserving a secular character while promoting the Christian ideal of love and service.



## II. OBJECTIVES AND CORE VALUES

**Objectives:** The college endeavours to realize the full potential of students by preparing them for fulfilling careers, entrepreneurship and higher education. Taking into account the pivotal role played by the college in the promotion of higher education in Kerala, IGNOU has established a special study centre in Bharata Mata College. The classes at this centre are handled by highly qualified experts in the respective areas.



### XIII. CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM

#### DURATION

The duration of U.G. programmes shall be **6 semesters**. The duration of odd semesters shall be from **June to October** and that of even semesters from **November to March**. There shall be three days semester break after odd semesters and two months vacation during April and May in every academic year. A student may be permitted to complete the Programme, on valid reasons, within a period of 12 continuous semesters from the date of commencement of the first semester of the programme.

#### SCHEME AND SYLLABUS

The U.G. programmes shall include (a) Common Courses I & II, (b) Core Courses, (c) Complementary Courses, (d) Open Course.

#### PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

There shall be a maximum of three credits for the open course and remaining one credit should be shifted to choice based course or any other core course

b	Total Credits required for successful completion of the programme	120
c	Minimum credits required from common courses	38
d	Minimum credits required from Core + complementary + vocational* courses including Project	79

\*The credit distribution for vocational courses is to be decided separately.

#### EXAMINATIONS

The evaluation of each course shall contain two parts:

- (i) Internal or In-Semester Assessment (ISA)
- (ii) External or End-Semester Assessment (ESA)



The internal to external assessment ratio shall be 1:4, for both courses with or without practical. There shall be a maximum of 80 marks for external evaluation and maximum of 20 marks for internal evaluation. For all courses (theory & practical), grades are given on a 07-point scale based on the total percentage of marks. (IS,,+ES,,) as given below.

Note: A separate minimum of 30% marks each for internal and external (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 40% are required for a pass for a course. For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of Grade E is required for all the individual courses. Candidate who secures E grade and above will be eligible for higher studies.

### **ASSIGNMENTS**

At least one assignment should be done in each semester (from I to IV semesters) for each course.

### **SEMINAR/VIVA**

A student shall present a seminar in the V semester and appear for viva-voce in the VI semester.

### **TEST PAPER**

At least one internal test-paper is to be attended in each semester for each course. All students are to do a project. The report of the project in duplicate is to be submitted to the department at the sixth semester and are to be produced before the examiners appointed by the University. There will be no supplementary exams. For reappearance/ improvement, the students can appear along with the next batch. A student who registers his/her name for the external exam for a semester will be eligible for promotion to the next semester. A student who has completed the entire curriculum requirement, but could not register for the Semester examination can register notionally, for getting eligibility for promotion to the next semester. A candidate who has not secured minimum marks/credits in



internal examinations can re-do the same registering along with the University examination for the same semester, subsequently.

## POST GRADUATE PROGRAMMES (AIDED)

**Duration:** The duration of PG Programmes shall be 4 semesters.

**Examinations:** There shall be University examination at the end of each semester. Practical examinations shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester or at the end of even semesters as prescribed in the syllabus of the particular programme. Project evaluation and Viva-Voce shall be conducted at the end of the programme only. Practical examination, project evaluation and Viva-Voce shall be conducted by two external examiners and one internal examiner. There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration in each lecture based course and practical course. A question paper may contain short answer type/ annotation, short essay type questions/ problems and long essay type questions. Different types of questions shall have different weightage.

**Evaluation:** The evaluation scheme for each course shall contain two parts; (a) End Semester Evaluation(ESE) (External Evaluation) and (b) Continuous Evaluation(CE) (Internal Evaluation). 25% weightage shall be given to internal evaluation and the remaining 75% to external evaluation and the ratio and weightage between internal and external is 1:3. Both End Semester Evaluation (ESE) and Continuous Evaluation(CE) shall be carried out using direct grading system. Direct Grading: The direct grading for CE (Internal) and ESE (External Evaluation) shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 0 respectively. Grade Point Average (GPA): Internal and External components are separately graded and the combined grade point with weightage 1 for internal and 3 for external shall be applied to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA) of each course. Letter grade shall be assigned to each course based on the categorization provided in the following table.

A separate minimum of C grade is required for a pass for both internal evaluation and external evaluation for every course. A student who fails to secure a minimum grade for a pass in a course will be permitted to write the examination along with the next batch. For the successful completion of semester, a student should pass all courses and score a minimum SGPA (semester grade point average) of 2.0. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of her/his SGPA.

#### **Internal Evaluation:**

The internal evaluation shall be based on predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars, lab skills, records, viva- voce etc.

## XV. FEE AND SCHOLARSHIPS

### A. TUITION FEE

Students can either pay tuition fees in instalment or in total at the beginning of each semester on dates notified by the College office. If the fee is not paid on the due date, a fine of Rs. 5 or Rs. 10 will be charged. If both the fee and fine is not paid even by the extended date, the defaulter's name will be removed from the regular rolls of the college and entered in the defaulters' register. These students will not get the benefit of attendance till they are readmitted, even if they attend classes regularly during this period. To get readmitted, parents of students have to apply for the special permission of the Principal besides having to remit all the arrears of fees with fine. A receipt signed by the accountant should be secured for all such payments. There will not be a readmission fee. But students should remember that they will be admitted to the second semester only if the first semester dues are cleared and to the third semester only if the second semester dues are cleared. Students from scheduled tribes, scheduled castes and backward communities admitted on the strength of income certificate from the revenue authorities, will not be allowed to leave the college during the first semester unless all the fee of that semester is paid. This amount will be refunded if and when the grant in respect of such students is sanctioned by the Government.

*\* The special fees notified in the schedule of fees should be paid in the first year during admission and in subsequent years along with the first instalment of tuition fee. Tuition fee can be remitted either in lump sum at the beginning of the year or in instalments before each term. The fee defaulters will be removed from the roll and they will not get attendance even if they attend the class. Fee defaulters are liable to pay Rs. 50/- towards re-admission fee in addition to fine.*

### C. CAUTION DEPOSIT

Students are also requested to remit the caution deposit prescribed for their particular course, along with the first terminal fees. Caution deposit is a security for using the invested property of the management and shall be refunded at the end of a particular course of study, after the deduction of all dues, if any, to the college. To claim refund students should apply for the same in a prescribed form and produce the original receipt. Caution deposit should be claimed before the reopening date of the ensuing academic year.

Students belonging to SC/ST/OBC are exempted from payment of the caution deposit. But other backward communities should pay the caution deposit.

### D. FEE CONCESSION

Students belonging to the scheduled castes/scheduled tribes, OBC and OEC are eligible for fee concession, granted by the Harijan Welfare Department. OBC students will have to produce an income certificate from the village officer. Children of all registered fishermen are eligible for educational concessions from the fisheries department subject to conditions laid down for other eligible communities.



Students who are children of the Kerala Govt. servants who have died in harness or within six months after retirement will be eligible for full fee concession provided their guardian's annual income is below Rs. 4,000. Students who are children and grandchildren of political sufferers are also entitled to educational concession provided their annual income does not exceed Rs. 15,000/-

Students belonging to the forward communities too are eligible for the fee concession under The Kumara Pillai Commission Report. The concession is purely on means basis. The annual income should not exceed Rs. 1,00,000/-

## XVI. CAMPUS FACILITIES & AMENITIES

- 1. Cardinal Parecattil Auditorium** – A multi-facility fully air-conditioned auditorium with a seating capacity of 1500. It consists of a well-equipped stage, attractive lights with a provision for world class acoustic system with a warm and welcoming ambience. Two green rooms, an array of washrooms, ample storage, work and parking space make it a converging point of, academic space, cultural hub and utility. It serves as the venue for various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.
- 2. Audio-Visual Room** – To facilitate interactive learning, college has a well-designed, state-of-the-art multifunctional digital audio-visual room, equipped with technologically advanced electronic instruments, high end speakers, LCD Projector, a large screen for audio visual presentations. The facility can be used to record lectures and create e-content. The room is acoustically treated for better sound recordings. The room is arranged with theatre style seating with a seating capacity of around 80, giving students a live multimedia experience.
- 3. Mar Augustine Kandathil Students' Hall** – The student's hall near to college library with a capacity of 350 seats, has a spacious stage and all the facilities of an auditorium. Used for uplifting the artistic competitiveness and various skills of the student's community and conducting departmental functions, club activities and meetings of various student support organisation.
- 4. Seminar Halls** – There are four seminar halls - Mar Louis Pazhaparambil hall, Mar. Antony Cardinal Padiyara Seminar hall, Mar. Sebastian Mankuzhikari seminar hall, Mar Abraham Kattumana conference hall - in total in the different blocks with audio-visual facilities for seminars and conferences of an exclusive nature.
- 5. Examination Halls** – Mar. Jacob Manathodath examination hall and Mar. Varkey Cardinal Vithayathil examination hall are used for UG & PG examinations.
- 6. Golden Jubilee Block** – The College has a separate block for selffinancing courses, equipped with class rooms, faculty rooms, library, computer lab, washrooms as well as office for academic support. The 22 rooms of the Golden Jubilee Block are Wi-Fi enabled. Each of the classrooms is equipped with whiteboards and affixed with overhead LCD projector to facilitate the teaching-learning process, generally with a seating capacity of 65 students. The block has a well-equipped computer lab with 65 systems and a library with a collection of 800 books on different subjects.



- 7. Library** – The college library with a collection of over 58094 books, ebooks, 39 journals, 32 periodicals and 3 subscribed databases are the key source of academic assistance to the community. The library is fully computerized and digitalized with Machine Readable Catalogue facility for searching and Bar-coding for detection and transparency. For the overall management of library operations, the library is automated with the programme KOHA. The Dewey Decimal Classification Scheme, 22nd edition, is used to classify books.
- 8. IQAC** – The IQAC of the institution is situated on the ground floor to enable easy access to students and staff alike. Digitizing the academic and non-academic records, scheduling the various events and activities, etc, falls under the prioritized responsibilities of the IQAC. The exceptionally furnished air-conditioned rooms are equipped with computers and Wi-Fi facilities. The conference room within serves as a meeting hall for various official discussions. The spacious rooms are further segregated into cubicles to ensure the smooth functioning of the separate faculties and ensure productive aggregate output.
- 9. Reception** – The front office staff provide welcoming environment and appropriate hospitality for visitors. They support the ethos of the college and promotes professional image at all times. Queries of visitors are met promptly at the front office and they are directed to the places where they want to. The reception is equipped with different devices like photostat machine, printer and computer.
- 10. Computer Centre** – Offers short term courses in MS Office, Visual Basics & DTP. Internet browsing is available to the college community free of cost as the campus is wire-free.
- 11. Language Lab** – There are two language labs – one in the Main Block and the other in the MBA Block which facilitate students to fine tune their communication skills.
- 12. Media Lab** – A full-fledged media lab of the Malayalam Copywriting Course with NXG Camera, editing software, digital recorders and related facilities is the first of its kind in the state associated with an arts department. In addition to imparting hands-on training to students in copywriting and advertisement, it also provides them exposure to the international media scenario through movies, DVDs etc.
- 13. Book Stall** – The store provides stationery as well as services such as photocopying, printing etc. and also acts as a refreshment stall which serve snacks and beverages for both faculty and students at an affordable price



- 14. Canteen** – A well-furnished and spacious 2 canteens (main canteen & cafeteria near MSW block) which operates during the college working hours offers students with a wide variety of snacks and meals at subsidised and affordable prices, which fosters the health and well-being of all the members of the college.
- 15. College Chapel** – The College chapel is a place of prayer and provides a peaceful space for quiet reflection and solitude in the midst of the day to day stresses of student life. Class liturgies and Staff masses find a distinctively sacred home here along with regular First Friday mass.
- 16. Gandhi Square** – The lush green open space situated amidst the various department buildings serves as a much-needed refuge for the students during the break hours. The white bust of the great Mahatma- Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, adorns the central spot of the open courtyard, giving it the popular name of Gandhi square. The pathway leading to it canopied on both sides by luscious bamboo groves, is known for serving as the favourite spot for photography during festive days of celebrations for both the staff and students.
- 17. Hostel** – The College provides hostel facilities for boys of the self financing section. The rules and regulations are planned to help our students to be able to use their freedom wisely and at the same time practice self-discipline. The girl students are provided residential accommodation at five well equipped convent hostels
- 18. Counselling Room** – The counselling room located on the ground floor of the Commerce Aided block provides a safe, relaxed and confidential environment to work through individual challenges and stresses of the students and staff. Counselling cell works with students to help improve self-awareness, gain independence and skills to handle difficult situations.
- 19. Instrumentation Facility Centre** – Instrumentation facility centre comprises with facility to do research analysis of various materials using the instrument facility with a proper technical assistance of a technical assistant. The centre consists of 3 rooms and 2 computers. All rooms in the instrumentation facility centre provided with LED lighting facility mounted in the false ceiling and many racks for setting the instruments, sample storage.
- 20. Bank / ATM** – A branch of the SBT with ATM facility is functioning in the premises of the college.
- 21. Server Room** – Server room is located on the first floor of the main building of campus. The room have solid walls extending from the floor to ceiling. Physical access to the server room is limited to only one person who has legitimate responsibilities justifying such access.



- 22. Public Address System** – Communications are passed over to the students via the public address system provided in the class rooms and the public places in the campus.
- 23. Sports and Games Facilities** – Athletics tracks, Cricket ground with a tournament class pitch, Standard basketball court, Football ground, Two badminton court, Sporting equipment, kits and sportswear for the team members, Yoga centre, Gymnasium.
- 24. Botanical Garden** – Botanical Garden helps to create interest in flora among students. They act as an out-door laboratory which conserves flora in natural habitat. It is enriched with ornamental as well as medicinal plants, ferns and trees. Most of them display variety of flowers which attract insects, birds and butterflies.
- 25. Herbal Garden** – A dedicated space devoted to growing a specific group of plants called herbs or medicinal plants, tended by the Chemistry department has a collection of indigenous and rare herbs and medicinal plants used for pharmaceutical purposes. Apart from that, these plants also play a critical role in the health and well-being
- 26. Vermicompost Unit** – A method to recycle organic wastes using to produce quality compost. Red earthworm is the preferred species of earthworm because of its high multiplication rate and thereby converts the organic matter into vermicompost within 45-50 days. The casts are rich in nutrients, growth promoting substances, beneficial soil micro flora and having properties of inhibiting pathogenic microbes. The stable, fine granular organic manure thus obtained is utilized for campus flora seedlings and crop production.
- 27. Computer Lab** – The campus houses multiple computer labs functioning in varied capacities. All the labs are equipped with computer systems, tables, cushioned chairs, and overhead projectors. The air-conditioned rooms are well maintained and wi-fi enabled. They are equipped to meet the necessities of serving as language labs, common computer centres, and digital libraries. The labs situated at various points of the campus serve as venues for a wide variety of training sessions and classes.
- 28. Anatomy Lab** – The Department of Zoology has an Anatomy lab with a seating capacity of 40 students and 20 large tables for students to perform dissections and other practical experiments like titration, biochemical analysis etc. The lab is provided with 4 wash basins for students to collect water for dissection and also for various analyses and also for cleaning the glassware after use. In addition, the department has a Physiology laboratory also where we keep our chemicals and all the reagents, glassware etc. used in various experiments.



- 29. Common Dining Hall** – A spacious dining hall on the ground floor beneath the computer centre and opposite to the MSW building can accommodate around 75 students. Well ventilated and spacious with a peaceful and calm environment, caters the needs of the faculty, students and nonteaching staff.
- 30. Guest Room** – The college offers the delegates/visitors the best facility in terms of service, clean and hygienic ambience, and a pleasant stay with a well-furnished air-conditioned room. Well-equipped with all the necessary amenities such as television, telephone, internet access etc. required for quality staying.
- 31. Teacher’s Recreation Room** – The spacious, carpeted room next to the IQAC, equipped with tables chairs and the subtle necessities of comfort serves as the recreation room for the teaching faculty of the institution. The space provides a wide assortment of newspapers and magazines for the teachers to choose from and read in leisure. In addition. the recreation space open to the male and female staff alike, also offers an array of enjoyable games like Chess and Caroms-board to the faculty.
- 32. Naipunnya International Help Desk** – The international study help- desk of Naipunnya is located in the commerce aided block has several cubicles to help to cater the needs of the students. Two counsellors working alternate days in the college for guiding the students through career guidance and information services about the abroad universities and equipping them towards it.
- 33. RUSA Examination Hall** – A sponsored scheme by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India used for UG and PG examinations.
- 34. Rain Water Harvesting** – used to conserve rainwater by collecting, storing, conveying and purifying of rainwater that runs off from rooftops, roads, open grounds, etc. for later use.
- 35. Toilet** – Available in every block. These include 8 toilets for staff and 40 toilets for students. The ladies toilet block houses napkin vendor and incinerator.
- 36. Lift** – The college has 2 lifts to facilitate the movement of people and others resources up and down across floors.
- 37. Parking** – The student’s parking space in the campus is approximately 30,000 sq. feet with a capacity of parking around 40 cars and 180 motorbikes which is located behind the main building of the college.

## XIX. RULES OF ATTENDANCE AND GENERAL BEHAVIOUR

True to the motto 'For God & Country', BMC endeavours to train young students who enter its portals to grow into men and women of integrity and ability and loyal citizens of the city of God and our motherland. The rules and regulations of the college and the supervision of the staff and management are means to achieve these ideals rather than restriction on personal freedom.

1. Students and Staff of the college shall co-operate with the college authorities to ensure a peaceful atmosphere congenial to the academic activities and overall development of the students and for the maintenance of discipline on the campus.
2. The college timing is from 9.30 am to 3.30 pm and regular classes will be conducted from 9.30 a.m. to 3.30 p.m. Students should not arrive late to the classroom. At the stroke of the third bell, students should stand up in silence for the morning prayer.
3. Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period by the teacher-in-charge of the class.
4. A student is required to secure 75% attendance in order to be eligible for university examinations or to contest in elections. If absent for more than three days, the parent will be asked to meet the HOD.



5. Absence from class for an hour will be considered as absence for the entire session concerned. Absence for 2 or more hours will be treated as absence for one full day.
6. Absence must be regularised by a leave letter without which attendance shortage will not get condonation at the university level. (The format is available in the college store.) Students can apply for condonation upto 10 days. Condonation will be granted twice during a course.
7. Application for leave, countersigned by the parent/guardian/warden should be submitted to the Principal in person.
8. When leave of absence is required in case of illness for more than three consecutive days, application for the same must be supported by a medical certificate.
9. A student absenting himself/herself without leave for more than ten consecutive working day will have his/her name removed from the rolls. He will be readmitted only on payment of all fee dues with fine.
10. Students should leave the campus by 5.00 pm. in the evening
11. Students are expected to be clean and decorous in dress, language and behaviour. Students are not allowed to wear shorts, short tops, sleeveless tops inside the campus. Boys should not grow long hair or beard.
12. Students are permitted on the campus during holidays only with the presence of a teacher.
13. Students are to make use of the library during free hours and shall not loiter about on the verandas or corridors of the college.
14. Students shall use the property of the college with care and keep the building and furniture clean.
15. Any student who is persistently insolent, or insubordinate or who wilfully and repeatedly commits mischief or is guilty of fraud or malpractice or who in the opinion of the Principal is likely to have an unwholesome influence on his fellow students or tarnish the reputation of the institution shall be removed from the rolls. The removal shall be either temporary or permanent subject to the gravity of the misconduct.
16. Misbehaviour from any member of the College Community towards girl students, use or threat of violence against the members of the staff, physical violence or mental abuse on fellow students, drunkenness, use of drugs and smoking inside the campus will be considered very serious cases of misconduct warranting disciplinary action including dismissal.



17. Ragging is a very serious criminal offence under Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998 and is punishable with 2 years imprisonment along with a penalty of Rs. 10,000/-. Students committing the offence will be expelled from the institution and they shall not be given admission to any other educational institution for a period of 3 years from the date of expulsion. (Kerala Ragging Prohibition Act 1998).
18. Students should wear their photo-pasted identity cards while on campus. Students who fail to do so will lose their attendance for the day.
19. Students are not permitted to keep their belongings in the security cabin or other common areas.
20. Fee concession to SC/ST students will be granted only on the basis of their monthly attendance in class.
21. A student engaged in Union activities or other activities assigned by the college may be given an attendance concession for maximum 10 days only.
22. Under no circumstance, students undergoing disciplinary action will be allowed on the campus. They will not be permitted to attend or take part in the public functions of the college or to participate in the study tours of the department.
23. Students/teams authorized by the college and principal alone will be permitted to take part in the University Youth Festival/Intercollegiate Fests.
24. Prior written sanction is to be taken from the Principal for all seminars, fests, talks conducted by the departments/clubs etc. and of the guests to be invited, including that of the College Union activities.
25. 5000 watts is the maximum sound permitted for the sound systems.
26. Intercollegiate Fests are to be permitted on Fridays and Saturdays only. Cinematic Dance, Fashion Show and DJs are not permitted. Road Shows and Treasure Hunt are not permitted during working days.
27. Students are not permitted to enter or sit in other classes.
28. Performing cinematic dance and fashion shows within Educational Institutions is also prohibited by the Government vide G.O. No. 346/05 H.E. dated 1-3-05.
29. All expressions of activities which are immoral, anti-social, communal and anti-national are strictly prohibited on the college campus. allowed to be parked inside the campus



- 31 During college hours the gates will be open for vehicles only during lunch break.
- 32 Unauthorised entry of outsiders into the campus is strictly prohibited. Unless permitted in by writing the college authorities, students shall not bring or entertain outsiders within the campus during working hours and during the college functions.
33. No vehicle is allowed to ply through the campus during college hours. Entry and exit of two-wheelers are allowed only through the northern gate of the college until further notice. Vehicles are expected to be parked only in the space provided for the purpose.
34. Nobody shall collect money from others either by request or by coercion or buy and sell any article in the college campus except with specific permission of the Principal.
35. It is forbidden to organize or attend meetings other than the official ones which are specifically permitted by the Principal. No political activity shall be permitted in the campus. Strong disciplinary action will be taken against those who break these rules.
36. Use of mobile phones by students inside the campus is strictly prohibited during class hours ie 9.30 am to 12.30 pm and 1.30 pm to 3.30 pm.
37. It is not permitted to distribute or circulate any notice, pamphlet, leaflet etc. within the campus or exhibit any type of banners, flags, posters, notices etc. within the campus without prior sanction of the Principal. Announcements and notices signed by the teacher-in-charge/HOD and countersigned by the Principal only will be entertained in the classrooms.
38. It is not permitted to stick bills, posters or scribble on any part of the building, compound wall, any wall, black boards or furniture. Damage to college property will warrant strong disciplinary action.
39. The campus is a smoke-free zone. Smoking or selling cigarettes and other tobacco products and drugs in an area within a radius of 100 yards of the Educational Institution is prohibited vide GO No. 822/05/H Edn. dt. 12.05.2005.



40. Students are to abide by the motto- Clean Campus Green Campus. Campus is following the Govt. Instruction to undergo green protocol. So it is advised to avoid plastic items such as Flex, banners, cups etc.
41. Instructions for students appearing for examinations: The students are expected to be present in the exam hall 15 minutes before the bell; those who reach after the bell will not be allowed to enter.
- The students should collect their hall ticket on the day before the examination; in case of some technical errors in getting the hall ticket from the university, the students themselves should carry out the necessary formalities.
  - The students should bring their hall ticket and college id card to the exam hall; if missing/lost, a fine of Rs 100/ should be remitted at the office to get the provisional id card/ hall ticket.
  - The students are not expected to carry mobile phones, bags, writing boards, pouches, pictures or any such materials to the examination hall.
  - If caught for malpractices in the exam hall, corrective measures like banning from writing examinations will be taken.
  - In case the student wants to write the exam in a separate room due to some physical ailments, it should be informed to the Controller of Examinations in advance.

## **MAHATMA GANDHI UNIVERSITY STUDENTS' CODE OF CONDUCT RULES - 2005**

Mahatma Gandhi University Students' Code of Conduct Rules-2005 introduced vide UO. No. 162/2004/2/Elen, dated 16 February 2005 has laid down rules for maintaining discipline in all colleges affiliated to the university, which will be binding on all students of the college. The university order prohibits political activity inside the campus. Political activity is defined as "any act, activity or conduct by any student in a college by which political ideologies of any political parties recognized by the Election Commission are preached, professed, imparted or disseminated by speeches, visible representation or other means of communication whatsoever".

Prohibition on political activity inside the campus means the following:-

- (a) No student of a college shall get himself involved in any political activity by himself or abet the said activity to be carried on by fellow students inside the campus in any manner whatsoever and any such activity is hereby banned inside the campus.



- (b) Taking part in any political activity by organizing students or gathering inside the college campus for the purpose of doing any activity as defined in Rule 4 shall constitute serious indiscipline. Every member of such a gathering shall be individually liable and responsible for the gross indiscipline in this regard and the Principal has the power to take disciplinary action against students who indulge in 4 the aforesaid activities.
- (c) It shall constitute gross indiscipline to call for an appeal to strike based on policies and ideologies that may be preached by the political parties or their sister organizations or student wings. The participants in the strike as aforesaid shall be dealt with by the disciplinary authority and they will be punished as per the rules stated above.
- (d) No student of a college shall stage or indulge in any activity like dharna, gherao obstructing entry and from any class room, office hall or other places inside the campus and such activities shall be treated as misconduct.
- (e) No student shall shout slogans inside the classrooms, office or any other place inside the campus and obstruct or cause disturbance to the everyday functioning of the institution.

## **XX. STUDENTS' CODE OF CONDUCT**

The students accept to obey the rules and respect the discipline of the college once they are enrolled in the college. Students are expected to obey the following rules:

1. Work in the college begins every morning, with a prayer recited on the public address system. Students are to remain standing wherever they are and participate silently in the prayer.
2. Students should attend classes with regularity and punctuality.
3. Students are required to dress modestly and to refrain from causing disturbance to anyone inside the classroom or on the campus.
4. Students are expected to be in their seats before the teacher enters the classroom and during free hours they may make use of the Reading Rooms in the General Library.
5. Every student shall handle college property with care. He/she shall keep the classroom clean and tidy. Students found guilty of writing or making marks on the walls of any building of the college or causing damages to college property shall be severely punished. Loss caused by damage to furniture or equipments belonging to the college will be made good by imposing collective fines from the respective students. Waste paper should be deposited in the bins provided for the purpose.



6. Students are not permitted
  - (a) to convene or attend meetings of any sort in any circumstance anywhere in the college buildings or campus
  - (b) to set up entertainments or organise social functions in the college,
  - (c) to make use of megaphones and loudspeakers on the campus,
  - (d) to invite persons who are not approved of by the Principal and the Council of the Heads of Departments for any function in the college.
  - (e) to collect subscriptions of any kind
  - (f) to put up notices anywhere on the campus
  - (g) to place any paper, periodical or book in the Reading Rooms or circulate them in the college
  - (h) to work in the campus for any organisation outside the college
  - (i) to be on the campus one hour before and after the college working hours without the previous sanction of the Principal
7. All sorts of political activities are banned in the college. Students are forbidden to take membership in any student organisation of a political nature. Nor are they permitted, within the campus, to lead or partake in any act of propaganda or protest called for by such organisations.
8. The use of mobile phones, by students during class hours is forbidden.
9. Smoking, drinking alcohol, ragging, eve teasing, using abusive language and other anti-social activities are strictly prohibited.
10. Any notification published on the college website or notice signed/ countersigned by the Principal and published on the College Notice Board shall be considered as having been brought to the notice of the college community.
11. Photo identity cards will be issued to all students in the college. Every student is expected to wear it in the College. A student who is unable to produce his/her ID card on demand shall be reprimanded and fined.
12. Any student who, in the opinion of the Principal, is likely to have an unwholesome influence on others on the campus will have to face disciplinary action.
13. The authority of the Principal in matters of discipline is final.
14. Any questions or issues not covered by the foregoing rules shall be decided by the Principal.

All the students are obliged to follow the Mahatma Gandhi University Students' Code of Conduct Rules 2005.



## KERALA RAGGING PROHIBITION ACT 1998

1. അങ്ങനെയുള്ള വിദ്യാർത്ഥിയെ ശല്യപ്പെടുത്തുന്നതോ അധിക്ഷേപിക്കുന്നതോ, പരിഹസിക്കുന്നതോ ഉപദ്രവിക്കുന്നതോ, അല്ലെങ്കിൽ
2. ഒരു വിദ്യാർത്ഥി സാധാരണ ഗതിയിൽ സ്വമനസ്സാലെ ചെയ്യാൻ ഒരുമ്പെടാത്ത ഏതെങ്കിലും പ്രവൃത്തി ചെയ്യുന്നതിനോ നിർവഹിക്കുന്നതിനോ ആവശ്യപ്പെടുന്നതോ ഉൾപ്പെടുന്നതാകുന്നു
3. റാഗിംഗ് നിരോധനം: ഏതൊരു വിദ്യാഭ്യാസ സ്ഥാപനത്തിന്റെയും അകത്തും പുറത്തും റാഗിംഗ് നിരോധിച്ചിരിക്കുന്നു.

## XXI. LIBRARY RULES

1. Library is a place for serious study and research. So strict silence is to be maintained.
2. The library will be open from 9.00 am to 5 pm on all working days and Saturdays. (except public holidays and second Saturdays)
3. Identity card is compulsory for entering the library.
4. Books are issued against the library membership cards on all working days till 4 pm.
5. Reference books and periodicals will not be issued for home reading.
6. Students must examine the books taken by them and report to the librarian if the books are in a damaged condition before taking them away.
7. Any book lost or damaged, must be replaced with the same one or latest edition. (in case of multi-volume set, complete set should be replaced).
8. The library card must be returned on the completion of the course. In case of loss of membership card, a fine of Rs 50/ will be charged and a fresh card will be issued against an application in writing to the librarian.
9. Circulation Rules: The loan period is 14 working days for all categories of readers. Renewal is possible only one time and it is for 7 days only. UG – 2 Books, PG - 4 Books, Research Scholar – 5 Books, Faculty – 10 Books, Guest faculty – 5 Books, Non teaching staff - 3 books.
10. All the readers should submit their library books during vacations and continuous leave in the college.
11. On failure to submit the books on or before the due date, you will be charged a fine of Rs: 1/ per day per book till you return.
12. No-due certificate should be collected from the library on retirement/ expiry of contract/course completion/course discontinuation etc.
